She brought the pears to Kansas when the family emigrated from Ohio and placed them in a cellar, where they were forgotten until found Wednesday.

REBELS RETREATING

LONDON, Dec. 23.—General Li Chin Lin is retreating southward from Tientsin before the fury of General Feng Yu Hsiang's attack, according to a dispatch from Peking to the Daily Express. Li, presumably is falling back on Shantung.

NO DIRECT HEIRS FOR HUGE FRANK MUNSEY FORTUNE

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Frank A. Munsey, the newspaper publisher, who died here Tuesday, left no direct heirs to the fortune estimated at \$20,000,000. Munsey, who was 77 years old when he died, started business with \$40 which he had borrowed.

Mrs. John Hyde of St. Petersburg, Fla., a sister, was the only close relative of the late publisher of the Sun and the New York Telegram. His only other living relatives are three cousins, children of his mother's brother. They are Samuel Alfred Hopkins of New York; Mrs. Helen Hopkins Hazleton of Ramford Falls, Maine; and Miss Martha B. Hopkins, who teaches in a high school class in Portland, Me.

Mrs. Frederick Hopkins, widow of a fourth cousin, lives in New York.

Munsey succumbed to peritonitis which followed an operation for acute appendicitis. Just recently he had attended a White House dinner.

CAPTAIN RETURNS

Harry E. Doornik, captain in the infantry reserve has just returned from a two weeks tour of active training with the Seventh United States Infantry of Vancouver barracks in Washington.

Ten reserve officers from different points in Oregon were assigned to active service for the period. They were assigned with the regular army units and functioned as a regular officer for the training period, according to Dobbin.

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Weed Liquor Raids Start Controversy

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23.—An aftermath to prohibition raids at Weed, Calif., several weeks ago, Police Captain Charles Goff, and Henry W. Hess, legal aide, who made a report to Washington on the affair, clashed in hot dispute here Tuesday.

"What did you say I helped the Ku Klux Klan for?" Goff wanted to know.

The police official, who formerly headed prohibition forces in this district, said later that he had left federal duty before the Weed raids, and emphasized a denial of any connection with the Klan.

The Hess report on the Siskiyou county raids intimates that Klan members had a large part in the enforcement drive. It also contains affidavits showing that Goff was advised by these members of numerous liquor law violations in their territory.

Hess denied intention of linking Goff with the Klan.

NAVY BLAMELESS IN AIR DISASTER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—A verdict absolving the navy department of all blame for the Shenandoah disaster is expected to be returned by the special naval inquiry court before the first of the year.

After an investigation extending over a period of three and one-half months, the naval court closed its hearings Tuesday, following an eloquent plea for a finding of "inevitable accident," by Commander E. C. Rosendahl, senior surviving officer.


Rosendahl, the only "interested party" to speak, reviewed the sensational charges of guilt that had been made before the court, and with a few words dismissed them as "unfounded and unimportant."

The court then adjourned to deliberate on findings. Admiral Hilary P. Jones, president of the board,

announced that a report probably would be delivered to the judge advocate general's office, and to Secretary of Navy Wilbur before January 1. Rosendahl's conclusion that "the disaster could not have been averted," and that it was an "inevitable accident," was in line with the attitude which those connected with the court have taken throughout the sensational inquiry.

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
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
