Senate Pages Hold Animated Session

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Vice President Dawes gathered up the 14-year-old senate pages Wednesday, fed them a big Christmas dinner and then made them listen to a fervent defense of his proposed rules reform.

Before the luncheon the pages held their annual mock session of the senate, voted against prohibition 10 to 7 and debated the Dawes censure reform. They gave Dawes a pipe, but not an upside one.

The "senator from South Carolina" led the debate.

"In the inexorable course of human actions and human conduct, Mr. President," the "South Carolinian" began.

"The senator from South Carolina is out of order," shouted young gentlemen from Indiana and Wisconsin.

A 14-year-old Dawes rapped for order.

"It becomes my bounden duty to bring to the attention of the most august body in the world the question of senate rules, which have outraged public opinion and halted the proceedings in this body."

The debate was interrupted for a moment by the return to the floor of a real senator. Upon his departure it resumed and finally ended in the vote on the repeal of the 18th amendment.

At the luncheon Dawes commended the boys on their cloture debate and said that he hoped that it would be debated by their employers "with the same spirit of good nature and as ably."

Child Dies From Drinking Whiskey

HOUSTON (Texas), Dec. 24.—(United News)—The half pint of corn whiskey which M. M. Cusimino reserved for Christmas day has caused the death of his 2-year-old son, Walter.

The infant died in agony Wednesday night, less than two hours after drinking most of the contents of the bottle, which it found on a table in the Cusimino home.

Cusimino rushed the child to a hospital, where it died after the usual remedies for sobering were administered.

CARSON CITY, Nev., Dec. 23.—Claude R. Sweezy, Jr., will be returned to the Nevada state prison by Inspector Dan Renar, state policeman, who will leave Thursday for Cincinnati, where Sweezy has surrendered himself.
