Alabama Crimson Team on Hand for New Year's Game

PASADENA (Cal.), Dec. 24.—
(United News)—Alabama's "crim-
son tide," undefeated football squad
of the southern conference, swept
into sunny Pasadena Thursday and
had their first workout at the Rose
bowl, where they meet the Univer-
sity of Washington eleven on New
Year's day.

The party was made up of 22
players and 23 followers and was
headed by Horace Wade, coach, Dr.
George Denny, president of the uni-
versity, and S. V. Stafford, presi-
dent of the southern conference.

team will engage only in light prac-
tice, he said.

COLE PLANNING COUNTER ACTION

Says Motorists Who Hit
Pecholt Are to Face
Court Charge

Announcing that he would file
an affidavit of prejudice against
Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt, and
that he would swear to complaints
accusing E. Schultz and E. Cald-
well of being "hit and run" mo-
torists, William Cole, prohibition
officer, indicated by the grand
jury for the alleged shooting of
one man and the slugging of an-
other, yesterday opened a counter
attack against those from whom,
he says he feels, he has received
unfair treatment.

Last night District Attorney El-
liott stated that, if the charges
were filed by Cole, as he had stated,
Elliott had not been advised
of the action. Late yesterday af-
ternoon Cole filed his affidavit of
prejudice with Charles F. DeLap,
acting clerk of the circuit court.

Has No Attorney
Cole's announced action against
Schultz, or Caldwell, or both,
would be taken in the hope of
clearing himself of the charge of
striking Frank Pecholt, manager
of the Country club. Cole says
that he employed no "sap" and
contends that an automobile was
responsible for the injuries suf-
fered by Pecholt.

Although Cole had, yesterday, no
attorney to represent him, he told
newspapermen that he would have
a lawyer from Salem.
Cole is at present at liberty un-
der \$1,000 bail.

3 TRAINMEN DIE IN RAIL SMASH

Former Secy. John Weeks
Among Passengers of
Ill-fated Trains

MONCKS CORNER, S. C., Dec.
24.—Three trainmen were killed
and another probably fatally in-
jured when two crack Atlantic coast
line trains crashed head on two
miles south of here Thursday. The
northbound Havana special, trav-
eling at a speed of more than 50
miles an hour, hit the southbound
west Indian limited, going between
40 and 50 miles an hour. Engines
of both trains and four cars piled
up.

The dead are: Herbert Parrish,
Florence, S. C., engineer of the
Havana special; Bux Cummings,
Savannah, Ga., engineer of the
west Indian limited, and Baxter
Florence, fireman of the Havana
special. The negro fireman of the
west Indian limited was caught
under the wreckage and suffered
probably fatal injuries.

All passengers were badly bruised
and shaken up.
Former Secretary of War John
W. Weeks and his wife were shak-
en up and bruised. Mrs. Weeks
also suffered a minor injury to her
back.

Failure of the west Indian limited
to obey stop over was given as the
cause of the wreck.

RABBI WISE RESIGNS
NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—(United
News)—Rabbi Stephen S. Wise has
tendered his resignation as chair-
man of the \$5,000,000 Palestine
fund as a result of orthodox Jewish
protests against his sermon of last
Sunday in which he said that "Jews
must accept Jesus" as a teacher.

It is indicated by the Zionist or-
ganization of America, which has
charge of the Palestine appeal, that
Rabbi Wise's resignation would be
accepted, although he has insisted
that the matter be placed before the
executive committee.

FOUR PARDONED.

PORTSMOUTH (N. H.), Dec. 24.—
Four court-martial prisoners re-
ceived holiday pardons Thursday.
Those pardoned were John W.
Hanson and W. H. Peters, Chic-
ago; Everett T. Waller, Sonora, Cal.,
and W. F. Schultz, Milwaukee.
Schultz was within eight months
of the expiration of his sentence,
but the others had two years more
to serve.
