To the Klamath River Boom Company and to whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that public hearing on the application of the Klamath River Boom Company, a corporation, praying for an order of the Public Service Commission of Oregon granting a franchise under the provisions of Chapter 128, General Laws of Oregon for 1917, for the driving, catching, booming, sorting, rafting, holding, and handling of saw logs and other timber products on Klamath River, in Klamath County, Oregon, will be had and held at the Court House, Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 1st day of March, 1926, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock A. M.

The waters upon which the applicant asks for a franchise are described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point in the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section seventeen, Tp. 39 S. R. 9 E. W. M., where the low water line on the south shore of the Klamath River is intersected by the westerly boundary line of the right of way of the Lost River Diversion Canal of the United States Bureau of Reclamation; thence running northwesterly across the Klamath River at right angles to the thread of the stream to intersect the low water line on the north shore of the river; thence running down stream along said low water line to

a point where the same is intersected by the section line between sections twenty-three and twenty-four of Township Thirty-nine South of Range Eight East, W.H. Mer. thence running southerly across the Klamath River at right angles to the thread of the stream to intersect the low water line on the south shore of the river; thence running up stream along said low water line to the place of beginning.

The applicant contemplates making certain improvements along and upon the portion of the stream above named for the driving, catching, booming, sorting, rafting, holding and handling of saw logs and other timber products, as more fully set out and described in the application herein and upon the maps accompanying such application on file in the office of this Commission.
