

FARM RELIEF IS SPLITTING RANKS OF REPUBLICANS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—Cleavage between the eastern and western groups in the Republican party is becoming more pronounced, due to the revival of the farm relief issue. This schism has been hidden for the great personal prestige of President Coolidge during the last two years, but it is rapidly reappearing.

The evidence of it developed here yesterday when Senator Capper, Kansas Republican, and leader of the farm group, protested against the tariff made tariffs, and predicted that unless the Fordney-McCumber were modified an economic upturn would take place.

Capper has kept rather close to administration of late, but as agricultural situation has become an issue again he is resuming his independence, as are Senators Cullen and other former mild progressives.

The struggle between the west and east wrecked the party once, and it may be a source of trouble for less time. The tariff has been the usual vehicle because it is the most powerful power of the government. It has been written into the law of the land, while the west has been whittling at their expense, having been able to do little to get fighting mad about it. The farmer has always suffered from tariff legislation. Senator Capper said to delegates at the conference of the people's reconstruction league here, "because the tariff was made in the east. All in the farmer has had the short end of the stick. New Englanders, by opinion, have had too large a share in shaping our tariff policy." Capper also favors something like the McNary-Haugen bill for a general crop prices through a government export corporation, against which President Coolidge is firmly opposed.

FLOWERS GIVEN CHANCE AT GREB

Defeated Light Heavy Will Contend for Middle Weight Crown

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—(United News)—Tiger Flowers of Atlanta, who was defeated by Mike McTigue in their recent bout to decide which should challenge Paul Berenbach for the light heavyweight championship, is to have a title fight after all. The New York state boxing commission approved the negro boxer as official challenger of Harry Greb for the world's middleweight championship. Walk Miller, Flowers' manager, posted a check for \$2500 to bind the bargain.

Chairman James A. Farley and "Duke" William A. Muldoon, senior members of the New York state boxing commission, who have created world's champions, and otherwise ruled ring affairs since passage of the Walker law, are to be reappointed by Governor Al Smith, on January 1.

Farley, who is to be guest of honor at a testimonial dinner this week, was in line for state banking commissioner, but because of his able handling of boxing matters, it has been decided to keep him at his present post.

STAPAC PRODUCES HIS \$200 FOR LIQUOR FINE

A letter found by detectives among the effects of the embezzler, who lies at the point of death in a Long Island City hospital, indicated that Miss Burton had plotted to marry and then poison the "Senator," afterwards returning to her sweetheart. Money obtained from the missing A. B. Lewis was to be used to pay back funds Cowan had embezzled.

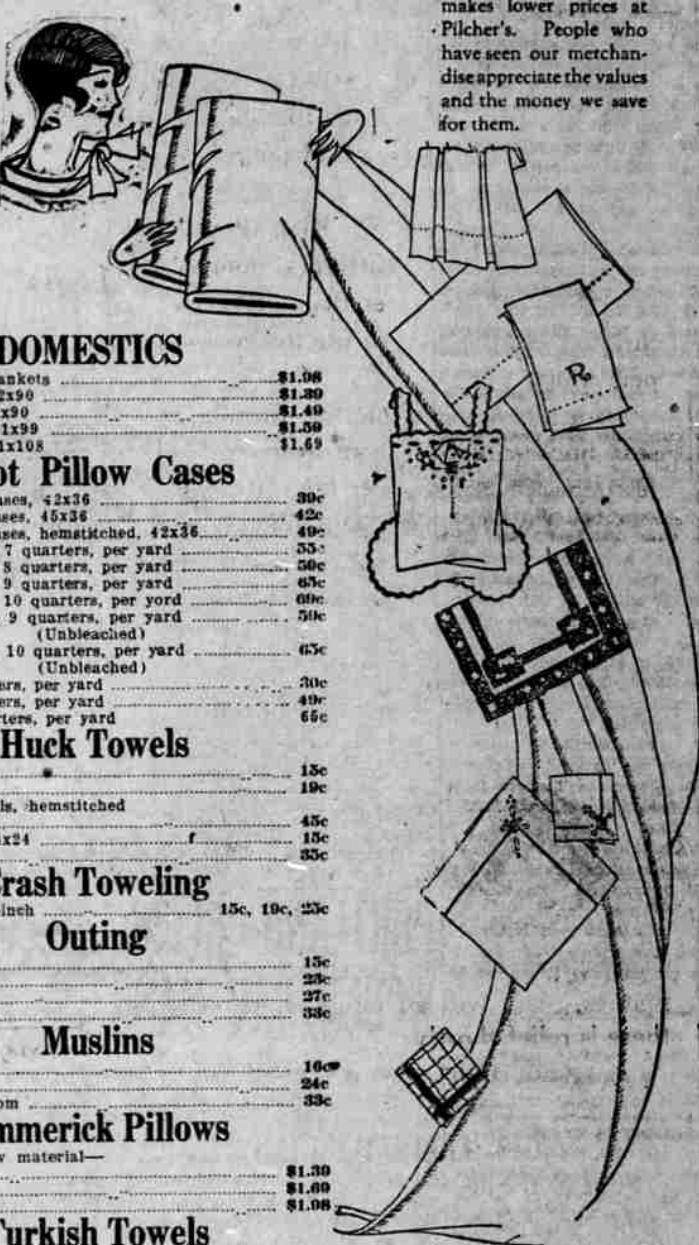
