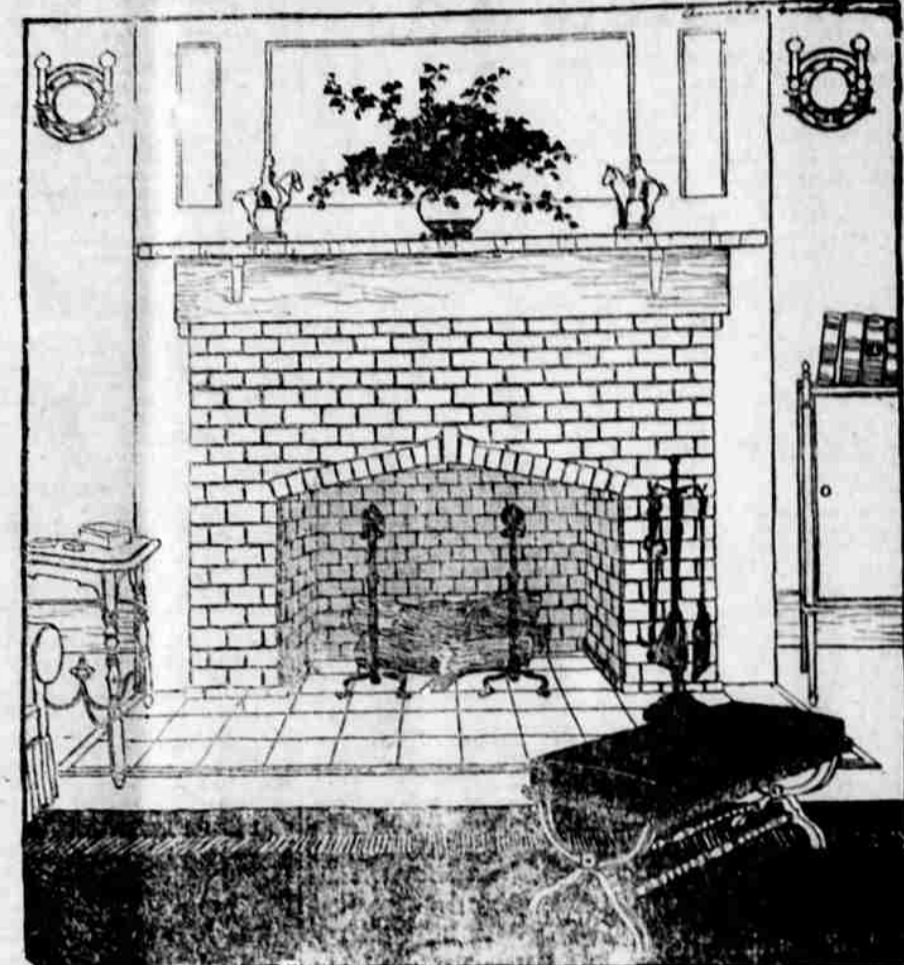
Chiloquin Visitor—George Beck, logging contractor of Chiloquin, is included in Tuesday's visitors in Klamath Falls.

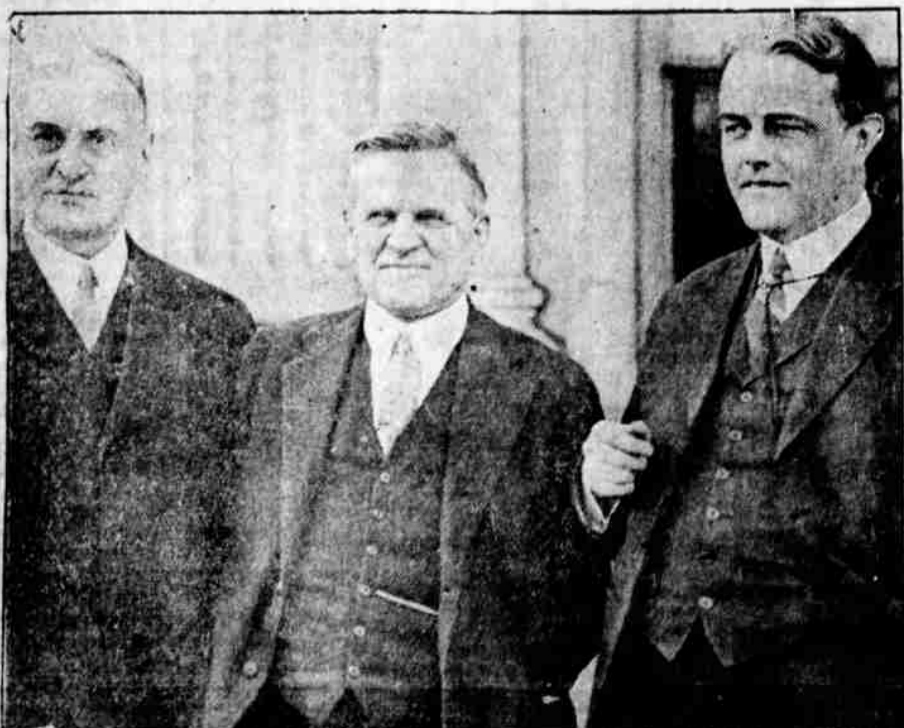
