LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30.—Los Angeles and vicinity will welcome the New Year with a blaring of trumpets, shouts, and the customary wee nip at home.

Southern California, contrary to frantic and repeated declarations by the prohibition units, will experience a wet and hilarious New Year's eve. Prospects for a gay time brightened considerably with the successful raiding by hijackers of federal, county and commercial liquor storehouses within the past few weeks.

The movie stars, it is safe to predict, will celebrate the occasion in their usual "quiet" way as usual, with a series of entertainments at their homes. ly, they were entitled to partial exemptions from liability by reason of the \$25,000 of municipal bonds in the county treasurer's hands. These, they maintained, should be sold and applied to the reimbursement of the county and county treasurer for losses due to the bank's failure.

This litigation, it was pointed out yesterday, may now be settled by a compromise by the county of Klamath, the First State & Savings bank, the five surety companies and the county treasurer.

The bank, it was said, is anxious to recover \$25,000 worth of municipal bonds, plus 6 per cent interest for four years. Should Judge Leavitt sign the petition the county treasurer would be forced to surrender the \$25,000 of bonds to the defunct bank.

over last year. Taking the situation nationally, the reports we now have at farm bureau headquarters indicate that the crop year from July, 1925, to June, 1926, will show some increase over last year. Our reports indicate that the farmers in 25 states will receive more money in 1926 than they received in 1925. In eleven states the income will be about the same, but twelve of our states will show a decrease over the past year.

1926 does not offer a bright promise for the mid-western states. The Illinois farmer will get very little, if any more than last year. The Minnesota farmer will get less. The dairy outlook in Wisconsin, Indiana and other mid-western states promises improvement. The wheat belt—North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas—is worse off than a year ago. The wheat crop in these states was 35 per cent short of last year.

Probably the happiest promise of the new year comes to the Pacific coast. Grains, fruits, vegetables and livestock at strong prices and with good crops, all combine to promise the Pacific coaster a prosperous new year.

## Last Signal Called For Old-Time Star

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—(United News)—Thirty-five years ago the praises of the "greatest football sport world was ringing with the player of all time," a slender, rather spindly-legged Yale freshman, named Frank A. Hinkey, chosen for the all-American of his year in college.

Football coaches and advisers gathered in this city for a series of conferences were sorrowed Wednesday by word from Southern Pines, N. C., that Frank Hinkey was dead. There were few among them who did not agree that, despite all the years between, and the development of the game, "Silent" Hinkey still ranks as "the greatest football player of all time."

As a linesman, an end who could not be blocked or taken out, and who hurled the 200 pound giants of his day to the ground with such force that many were incapacitated,

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there is no doubt of Hinkey's supremacy over all that went before or have played the game since his time. And he never weighed more than 120 pounds.

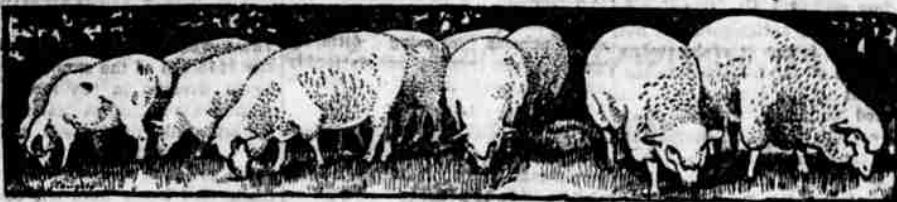
