Emergency bridge has been constructed. AMSTERDAM, Dec. 29.—December 1925, was the worst December in this country since 1848, according to weather Bureau statistics. Terrible gales and torrential rain have swept Holland. Most rivers are out of their banks. December swept Europe with gales, bombarded her with icy avalanches and hid her river valleys under flood water. From Ireland to Hungary the wild weather has set records. Belgium, Holland, southwest Germany, Hungary, Roumania and the Alpine region have suffered tremendously from rain and wind. Lancers report the Atlantic freezing under the sweep of gales and the pounding of rain. Mountainous seas are running in the Bay of Biscay. "The Atlantic is in an awful mess," a British air ministry official said Wednesday. Telephone and telegraph service is interrupted. Transylvanian peasants by the thousands have fled before flood waters which have devastated their homes and fields. The death list will be high. Villages are submerged; in some cases it is reported that only the church tower is visible. Martial law is reported in some districts.
