

SHARE OF THEY FORTUNE TO MUSEUM

YORK, Dec. 30.—One of the most remarkable wills ever filed in the state, that of Frank A. Munsey, multi-millionaire bachelor, has been made public in New York.

Munsey left an estate estimated to be worth \$40,000,000 and by bequesting by far the greater portion of that sum to the Metropolitan museum, he left the greatest single bequest that ever has been made for the advancement of art and culture.

The Metropolitan museum will receive the residue of the Munsey estate after other bequests are taken care of, and it is believed that the amount may reach \$20,000,000 or \$30,000,000.

Relatives, friends, associates and three institutions benefit by the will in amounts ranging from a \$500 annual income to a bank stock gift of something like \$600,000.

Among the friends remembered by the will is Mrs. Sophie Meltrin Coy, who married Ted Coy, the Yale football star, last January.

Munsey's newspaper properties, the New York Sun and the New York Telegram, are to be sold. Both these properties have tremendously increased in value since, five years ago, when Munsey made this will.

Munsey himself, apparently then had no idea of how much he was going to leave, for it is learned that the value of his estate has nearly doubled in the interim—the period of his greatest prosperity.

Little towns and cities in the state of Maine are thrilled with the news that many of the Munsey individual bequests are coming to friends and relatives in the state of the publisher's birth. Aside from the huge art museum gift the only substantial bequest is \$250,000 to the Bowdoin college, \$100,000 to the Maine state hospital at Portland, and \$50,000 to the Central Maine general hospital at Lewiston.

Thomas J. Brown, charged with conspiracy and rum running. Rum chasers numbers 150, 151, 170, 177 and 276, he said, were coast guard craft which he knew had worked with rum runners in landing their cargoes.
