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INDIAN DEB HAS COSMETIC BILL

Six Months' Beauty Parlor Bill Turned In to Secretary Work

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12. — (United News) — When the government took up the problem of civilizing the Indians it was believed that it had disposed of the disturbing custom of face painting.

An expense voucher of an Osage debutante received by Secretary of the Interior Work has disclosed the futility of such expectations. It asked for \$373 to pay for a six month beauty parlor bill incurred by the Indian maiden.

Work deducted 25 per cent from the bill, which included such items as hair puffs, rouge, powder puffs, massages, curls, lipsticks and cold creams. Some of the articles were bought every week.

The girl's cash balance from oil royalties, however, stood at \$39,770.

STILLMAN GUIDE ASKS BACK WAGES

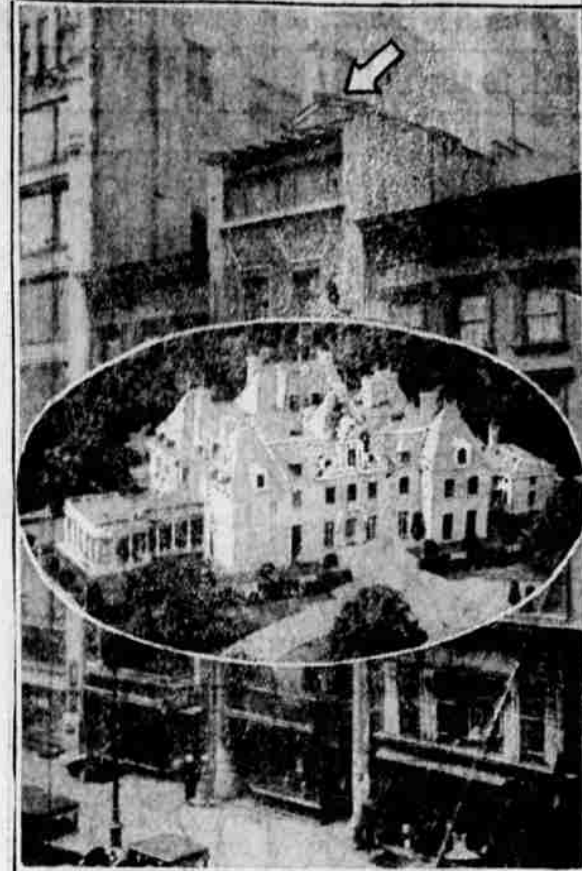
MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 12. — (United News) — On the eve of Mrs. Anne U. Stillman's divorce action against James A. Stillman, Fred Beauvais, the Indian guide who played such an important part in the bankers' suit five years ago, has again taken a hand in the game.

Beauvais has gone to Three Rivers, Que., to press his own suit against Mrs. Stillman for \$7000, which he claims to be due him for "back wages and expenses."

Mrs. Stillman's attorneys have asked that the trial of the Indian's case be delayed until February. Beauvais hopes to prevent further delay.

Beauvais declares \$7000 is due him for wages and expenses incurred in obtaining defense witnesses for the Montreal hearing of the original Stillman case. The claim is understood to be disavowed by Mrs. Stillman's attorneys on the ground that the Indian, who had been accused of being the father of Guy, the youngest Stillman child, was acting in his own defense.

Revival Gets Away With Flying Start

The Charles S. Price revival campaign that opened Sunday here is having a glorious beginning, according to Rev. O. LOS ANGELES, Jan. 12. — Final transfer of the Vernon baseball club to Joe Toplitzky, Los Angeles realtor, for a sum said to be \$250,000, took place at a meeting of the Pacific coast league officials here late Monday night.

Toplitzky announced immediately that he had transferred the club to Stanley Dollar of the steamship family of San Francisco, who in turn announced that W. H. McCarthy, former president of the league would be president of the club. The Vernon club will be transferred to San Francisco, and will be known as the Mission club with Walter H. McCredie as manager, and Howard Lorenz as secretary.

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
