TO RESTORE PEACE

HONOLULU, Jan. 12.—China's warring factions have decided to lay down their arms, restore former President Li Yuan Hung to power and thus bring peace to North China, according to a Tokyo dispatch to Hoshi Sha, a Japanese newspaper here. Information reaching Tokyo says the status of 1923 will be completely restored, with General Wu Pei Fu commanding the national forces and supporting the government.
