

# TURKISH WOMEN REAL FLAPPERS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 21.—Turkish women have thrown away the yashmak veil and are swarming into the drug stores demanding rouge and lipsticks, articles previously unknown outside the harems. Barbers display signs:

"Haircuts 15 piastres; Girls 25." A boyish bob then, costs 7 1/2 cents. All these phenomena are symptomatic of the modernization of Turkey, which has brought undreamed of privileges and pleasures to Turkish women.

Some of the older matrons retain their veils, pleading that they are too poor to buy hats; but Parisian modistes are doing a big business with the emancipated thousands.

Modernization has only slightly affected the European quarter of Pera, but Stamboul has been turned upside down. The mosques are almost deserted, even on Friday, the Mohammedan prayer day. Fashionably, and sometimes gaudily gowned women parade the streets, which once bore only sombre-garbed women, shrouded in long black veils. Not many women respond to the ulama's call when he mounts the minaret to summon the faithful to prayer.

**Allowed to Dance.**  
Special enthusiasm greeted the promulgation of a law permitting Turkish women to dance in public halls. The Charleston has not yet arrived, but the tango, the shimmy and the hesitation waltz are popular, although they are not skillfully executed. Foreign spectators are not welcome at the dance halls.

"Wait until the girls learn how," the managers suggest. "They are fresh from the seclusion of homes and harems and they are ashamed of their ignorance."

The people are closing the cabarets where nude and semi-nude dancing occurs after midnight. The men object; their women are glad. "We want to forget savagery and become civilized," the women say.

Special police squads are battling against the dope traffic. Cocaine, morphine and dourzo, the latter a Turkish absinthe, are under the ban. Polygamy still exists as a legal institution. The Angora assembly is considering its abolition. Woman suffrage is being discussed by the deputies and several feminist associations are endeavoring to obtain sex equality.

Among the darker aspects of Turkish modernization is the legalization of vice. Hitherto traffic in Turkish women was punishable by drastic penalties. Now the brothels contain almost as many Turkish as Russian, Greek and Armenian women. Dire poverty followed the political and financial collapse of Constantinople, left many women without other means of support.

Inhabitants of Stamboul protested against the creation of a vice district within their midst, so the municipality decided to transfer the district to Pera, which comprises the foreign quarter of Constantinople. Streets were set aside to house the newcomers.

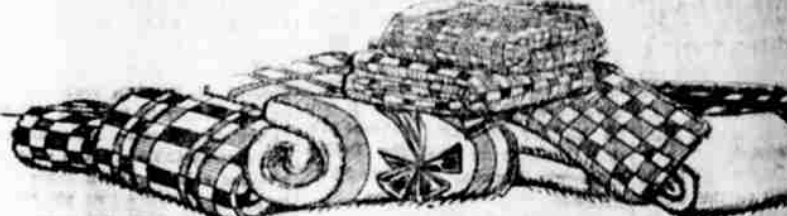

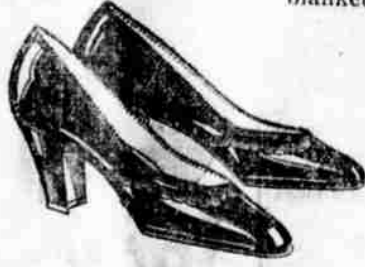
