COACH PREDICTS HELEN WILL WIN
BERKELEY, Jan. 27.—(United News)—The man who developed Helen Wills until the little co-ed became American and Olympian women's tennis champion has come to his pupil's defense when most experts are predicting that Suzanne Lenglen will defeat her on the Riviera.
William C. "Pop" Fuller admits that Helen's forearm drive is unorthodox, as claimed in New York by Samuel Hardy, manager-captain of several United States Davis cup teams.
"But I have not felt it worth while to attempt a correction of this fault, if it can be called a fault," he said. "Her drives need no apology."
Fuller also told Wednesday for the first time of his instruction to Miss Wills regarding a probable match with Mlle Lenglen.
To Play Fast.
"I urged her just before she left to play fast, hard tennis against Suzanne, right from the start," he declared. "I do not feel that she would gain anything by playing cautiously. The psychology of the situation is all in her favor for Lenglen is nervous and excitable."
"I saw the Frenchwoman play in 1921, and she is not without her faults, despite the fact that she is a marvelous player. I noticed that she does not handle shots directly at her as well as she does those which she takes on the run. I instructed Helen to keep driving the ball directly at her feet and believe she can win by these tactics."
Fuller said that Mlle Lenglen may have corrected this fault.
"But if she hasn't Helen is going to make things very interesting for her by playing to her weakness," he added.
