BRIDGE DENIED TO CLUB WOMEN

If Men Can't Play Poker
Society Bridge Taboo,
Says Chief

EMPIRIA, Kan., Jan. 28.—(United News)—It is the contention of Leroy Hart, chief of police here, that club women have no more right to play bridge on Sunday than men have to play poker week days, and he intends to do something about it. Chief Hart announced that he will invoke the entire category of blue laws in Emporia's code and that bridge players had better look out.

The announcement followed the closing of the pool and billiard halls in Emporia as a result of the insistence of club women and ministers that the ordinance which has been on the books for years be enforced.

"I'll meet their request and enforce the laws," said Chief Hart. "I'll enforce all of them and that includes card playing."

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state line market road. About \$22,000 has been spent leaving \$18,000, enough to complete the road. Judge Bunnell explained that he thought it had been good business to hold these bonds unsold. It is only necessary now to sell the bonds—if they can be sold—to complete the roads, the funds for which have been depleted to pay for other roads, the funds for which have been overdrawn.

It also determined that Judge Bunnell had been shown at Portland that the county did owe the federal highway department some money, and that a compromise had been effected under which the county would pay \$15,000. HELEN WILLS IN OLD TIME FORM

CANNER, Jan. 28.—(United News)—For the first time since she came to the Riviera Helen Wills really cut loose against an opponent Thursday afternoon and startled the gallery by the speed and power of her terrific drives.

The American champion was nettled by criticism of her showing against Rolande Vlasto in the morning and set out to smother her opponent, Miss Lina Cable, in the afternoon.

With her forehand and backhand drives working, Miss Wills defeated Miss Cable 6-0, 6-3, in the third round of the Gallia tournament. A line on her opponent's ability can be obtained from the fact that Miss Cable defeated Molla Mallory decisively at Mentone three years ago. The Californian's service was not working to her satisfaction, but she won 26 points and lost 11 in the first set and scored 30 to the English girl's 23 in the second.

The match between Miss Wills and Mlle. Vlasto, who is a sister of the famous "Didi" was uninteresting, the American winning 6-0, 6-2.

A new angle has entered into the Riviera's consideration of the forthcoming match between Miss Wills and Suzanne Lenglen. When the American loses a game or two she is cool as a cucumber and goes right on playing and winning. Mlle. Lenglen, on the other hand is so accustomed to conquering in straight sets that her somewhat unsettled temperament gets the best of her when she chances to lose a single game.

She becomes erratic and often quits the match. Those who are hoping for an eventful victory for Miss Wills believe Suzanne may lose her nerve if she drops a few games to the smiling, imperturbable Californian.

Three matches are scheduled for Miss Wills Friday. She meets Mrs. R. Haylock of England in the women's singles, and has two mixed doubles matches to play with her partner, Hillyard.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—With high winds still raging along the Atlantic seaboard, accompanied by extreme cold, the rearguard of trans-Atlantic liners which were buffeted and delayed by storms on their westward journeys put into New York Thursday.

The mighty Aquitania of the Cunard line, after bucking seas which were described by Sir James Charles, her commander, as the most severe in his experience, struck her pier as she was docking in the North river. The force of the 72 mile an hour gale carried the giant liner against a pier extension, of which 100 square feet of beams and planks were ripped away, the Aquitania being undamaged.
