Bend Officials Are Facing New Recall

BEND, Jan. 28.—(United News)—That Bend's city officials will face a recall election before February 25 was made practically certain Thursday when recall petitions designed to meet all the requirements mentioned in Recorder Louis Bennett's objections to the previous set of petitions were filed in Bennett's office by officers of the taxpayers' league.

The petition for the recall of Mayor R. H. Fox contained 646 names and each of them had more than 800 names. It was declared by Ross Farnham, chairman of the league. They ask the recall of the mayor and of Councilmen E. C. Silvis, Oscar Carlson, K. B. Well, C. P. Niewonger, O. C. Henkle and A. O. Schilling.

The officers against whom the recall movement is aimed have five days in which to resign after which Bennett must call an election within 20 days, unless flaws in the proceedings are claimed.
