INFORMATION BOOTH FOR ASHLAND ROAD

Members of the committee said they would have no trouble disposing of their option if the chamber does not go ahead with the lease.

It is not the intention of the committee to endeavor to hog the situation as far as other communities are concerned. Information on all of Oregon would be disseminated. Valley towns, the state chamber of commerce, and public land office representatives would be invited to make use of the Klamath branch of the chamber. Bend, it was stated, should particularly desire to participate in the plan. But the committee does not believe that a mecca for tourists can be established at the junction—a mecca that would leave no doubt as to where the road leading off the main highway leads.

Expect Opposition
Opposition is expected to the plan, of course. Some of it will emanate from the Pacific highway association, the purpose of which is to keep tourists on the Pacific highway. But the committee anticipates no trouble in this regard.

There are numerous plans for funding the proposition of the publicity committee, but none of them final. The committee wishes to raise the money locally to take over and develop the property, including placing an exhibit at the junction, the lease to divert to the chamber after private individuals who advanced necessary funds had been re-imbursed.

Another plan was to sub-lease to a desirable representative, who with the tourist information bureau as a drawing card, could be expected to realize handsomely.

Anyhow, the directors want the matter fully considered by the community as a whole as to its advisability. It will cost the chamber nothing, it was pointed out, private individuals placing the funds in the hands of trustees, acting on behalf of the chamber as managers, until such time as the chamber would come into possession of the lease cost free.

SHIP BODY OF U. P. MAN.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 29.—(United News)—The body of Harry A. Adams, 57, assistant general manager of the Union Pacific railroad, will be shipped to his home in Kansas City, according to plans of his widow. Adams died here Friday from pneumonia.

He was a prominent Mason and during the world war served on the interstate commerce commission in Washington.

RISQUE EDITORS GET SUSPENSION

Literary and Art Style of U. S. C. Publication Leads to Storm

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 29.—(United News)—Nude figures on the cover of a school magazine and certain good jokes are not nice, the faculty of the University of Southern California decided here Thursday in requesting three student editors not to register for the spring term.

Grady Setzler, editor of the "Wampus," an art magazine of the school, resigned his post after a scorching sermon by the faculty. Fourteen associates were similarly lectured.

Setzler, Maude Miller, associate editor, and John Post, art editor, admitted that they had been requested not to register for the new university term and to cease publication of their paper.

The action of the faculty was precipitated through an editorial attack on the "Wampus" by a suburban newspaper.

A week ago the University of California, southern branch, ordered the suspension of John Cohee, editor of "Hell's Bells," for his series of stories "affronting the good name of our co-eds."

a good American."

McCamant was questioned regarding his failure to support Johnson at the Chicago convention.

Had Slogan

"I ran for delegate on the slogan, 'For president, an American, a republican and a statesman,'" and I would not vote for no one who did not measure up to that standard," McCamant said. "There are persons born in the United States who are not Americans and who do not measure up to the American standard. I frankly admit I had in mind Senator Johnson."

Before the 1920 Oregon presidential primary, McCamant inserted in the voters' official pamphlet, this statement:

"I am not committing myself so I can better support the candidate who wins the Oregon primary."

Senator Caraway, Arkansas democrat, insisted that this was misleading to the voters as McCamant had privately said he would never vote for Johnson at the convention and did not. McCamant said that his statement was not technically a pledge or a promise and that as it was phrased in the present perfect tense so that it would not bind him in the future.

"Then why didn't you come out and say you would support anybody but Johnson?" Caraway persisted. "You were not frank with the people of Oregon."

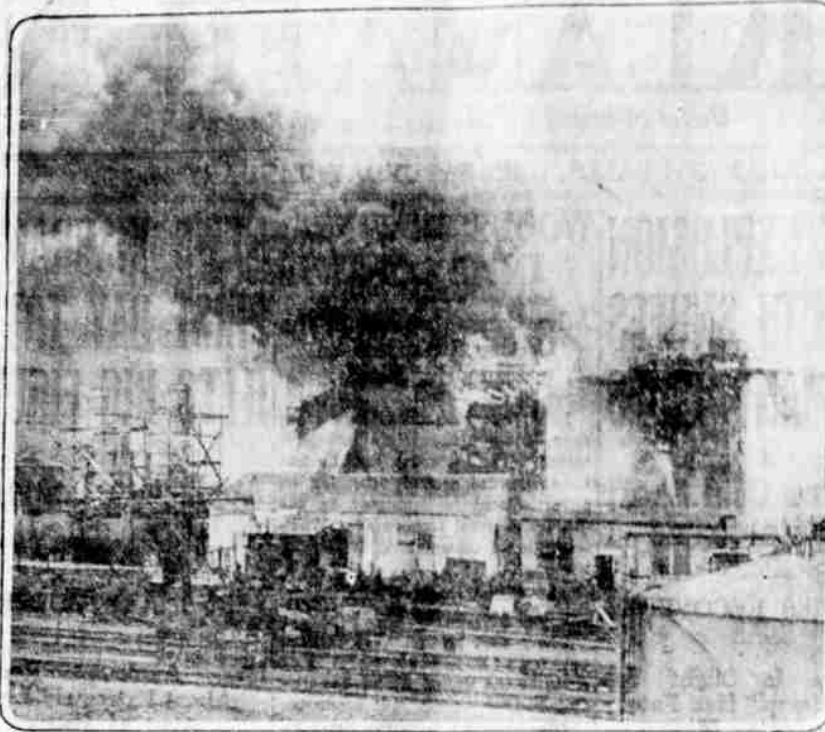

COL. MITCHELL TO RESIGN FEB. 1ST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(United News)—mayor hermit N.A.—(United News)—William Mitchell, less than a year ago assistant chief of the army air service with the rank of brigadier general, will be a free man Monday, out of the army after 28 years service.

Mitchell's resignation from the army was accepted Friday by Secretary of War Davis. Although Davis discussed the case with President Coolidge, war department officials insisted that the resignation was handled in the routine manner, the decision having been made by Davis.

The demoted colonel, deprived of all rank, duty and command after a courtmartial had tried him for his unprecedented criticism of the war and navy departments, looks forward to an active campaign on the lecture platform and in newspapers and magazines in behalf of his plan for reorganizing the national defense with more emphasis on aviation.

A single paragraph in the special army orders will make the termination of Mitchell's military career. It will say:

"The resignation of Colonel William Mitchell, air service, of his commission as an army officer has been accepted by the president."

A copy of the paragraph will be sent to Mitchell and his superior officer.

The announcement by the war department Friday was as follows:

"The secretary of war has decided that the resignation of Colonel William Mitchell, air service, will be accepted to take effect February 1, 1926. The adjutant general has been notified to this effect."
