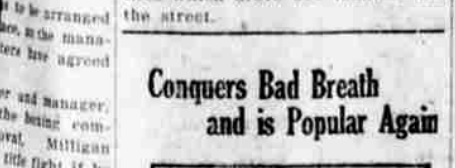
AIRPLANE DROPS FOOD FOR 5 MEN

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DIVERGENT IDEAS IMPEDE TAX BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(United News)—The sharp lines of difference in the senate on certain phases of tax legislation became apparent only a few minutes after the revenue measure was taken up. The time taken for airing these differences halted any progress on the first day.

The clerk had hardly begun to read the ponderous document to the handful of senators who were willing to listen to a discussion of such a subject as taxes after the dramatic world court debate, when he was interrupted by members who wanted to express their views. The exchange was frequently spirited despite the small attendance.

The opening speech of Chairman Smoot, of the finance committee, and the interruptions to his analysis favorable, and those speeches which followed brought out discussion of virtually every point at issue, including estate taxes, publicity, nuisance taxes, amount of total reduction and the time which should be allowed for consideration.

It became evident that every effort would be made to rush the measure. Senator Smoot insisted the senate should complete the bill by February 10, putting aside as impractical a suggestion of Senator Norris of Nebraska that the time payment of first tax installments be advanced to April 1 or 15 in order that more time would be given to citizens.

FIND BODY IN RIVER

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(United News)—The body of an unidentified man, possibly the victim of a murder, was found floating in the Willamette river today by dockworkers.

Death Immaterial Says Murderer, 15

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Jan. 29.—(United News)—A great many people breathed more easily when they learned that a commutation had saved Willie Cavalier, 15, from the electric chair, but not Willie.

"It don't make no difference to me," announced Willie, who had been sentenced to death for killing his grandmother and who must now stay in prison for life. "I've got to die some time and it might as well be now as any other time."

Willie's commutation was granted Tuesday; he was scheduled to die February 1.

DRY LEADERS AROUSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(United News)—Prohibition leaders are watching with concern the maneuvers of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews, who has just ordered a general reduction in the personnel of the dry army.

Washington representatives of prohibition organizations have received the news of the sweeping cut with alarm, coming as it did only a few hours after it became known that Andrews would resign within a year if enforcement conditions did not improve.

INTERNATIONAL RADIO TEST DECIDED FIZZLE

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—The elements themselves combined with practical jokers to make a fizzle of the third international broadcast tests.

The aurora borealis, two S.O.S. calls, storms on land and sea, interference from regenerative receivers and other factors were met by the committee in charge of the American arrangements and the thousands of fans who had hoped wistfully to "pick up" Europe.

Several American broadcasters transmitted hoax programs on the wave lengths used by some of the European stations. Hundreds of fans near Omaha, Neb., for instance, reported hearing a European station, only to hear their boasts blasted by investigation.

EXPLOSION FATAL

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 29.—(United News)—One seaman was killed, another is dying and four others were slightly injured when a four-inch gun exploded aboard the United States destroyer Farragut, off shore here Wednesday.

The ship was engaged in long range gunfire practice two miles off Point Loma when the accident occurred.

The dead sailor was Otis Lloyd Roger of Coner d'Alene, Idaho.
