UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 30.—(United Press)—The University of Oregon basketball team defeated the University of Washington quintet here tonight in a wild, exciting contest, 26 to 21.

Oregon jumped off to an early lead when Gunther converted a foul and followed with a field goal. Schloss scored from the floor for Washington and after eight minutes Brobst tied the count with a free throw.

From this point the score was tied for three minutes before Westergren sank a basket. He made two more before the half ended and Gross, for Washington, scored one, leaving the count at half time 9 to 5.
