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Hill, who planned the Oregon rail line to Klamath Falls.

"The Oregon Trunk is an unfinished line," he continued.

"Sixteen million dollars was put into the Oregon Trunk," he said, "and approximately \$100,000,000 in the lines in Oregon. The earnings have been exceedingly small, the chief reason being that the Northern line was not completed into the timber, while the Southern Pacific occupied all the fir timber region of southern Oregon."

Responding to questions, Hart said the Northern lines are willing to lease the Strahorn line, where it virtually parallels the new road from Bend, although the Strahorn construction is poor, he said, and in part will have to be rebuilt to make a first class line.

James G. Wilson, representing the Strahorn line, followed, sketching the pioneering work of Robert E. Strahorn and placing the Oregon, California & Eastern alongside the Southern Pacific in opposition to the extension of the Oregon Trunk, which he said would impair the investment in the Strahorn lines.
