

DEFICIENCY BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(United Press)—Without a record vote the house today passed the first deficiency appropriation bill, carrying \$381,236,254.

Before the final vote an amendment by Representative Howard, democrat, Nebraska, appropriating \$340,000 to the Omaha tribe of Indians of Nebraska was accepted by a vote of 181 to 107.

Other items in the bill include: For meeting the increases in the salaries of members of congress \$1,470,330; for the president's special air board \$11,963; for the veterans' bureau hospital construction \$8,000,000; for refund of illegally collected taxes \$149,250,000; for the coastguard to increase its fleet \$7,674,491; for the transfer of the army experimental station from McCook to Wright field, Dayton, Ohio, \$1,000,000; for the purchase of new equipment and completion of work on dam No. 2, Muscle Shoals \$2,600,000.

It will be noted that Ashurst thinks he will possibly have E. L. Elliott, district attorney, as an opponent in the field. But Elliott is a republican, so "Eliottism" must be a distinctive phase of public affairs that Ashurst knows is not entirely appreciated in Klamath county.

Tosses Glove

And if ever the gauntlet was thrown in an incumbent's face Ashurst has done the glove tossing. Elliott must declare himself, or admit that the principles of "Eliottism" have not the sanction of this community. He has been put in an extremely difficult situation from which any retirement will be ignominious, in the opinion of the politicians. And it is felt that Ashurst has deliberately endeavored to goad Elliott into the race.

Elliott, however, wins a measure of respect. His recent announcement of a clean-up cannot be understood to be of any large political advantage. If, however, he means business and is competent to put his utterances into action and results he can win the confidence of those who would support a fearless, capable and dependable man for district attorney. At least he can win some of them for there will be other candidates in the field with the same qualifications.

Wiest had nothing to say on the subject of his retirement from the office of district attorney. Some time back Elliott told him that he, Elliott, would not be a candidate. Wiest now has the office of deputy filled with work, which includes a number of tax delinquency foreclosures. He is also handling the presentation of several cases before the coming session of the grand jury. Were he to resign now the county business would suffer, and the possibility exists that even should Elliott run that he and Wiest may find it convenient, for the sake of the county, to make the race out of the same office. In this connection it should be noted that the deputy's office is in the Loomis building which separates him by a block from the main office in the court house which houses his chief.
