Falls during the past week by Mrs.

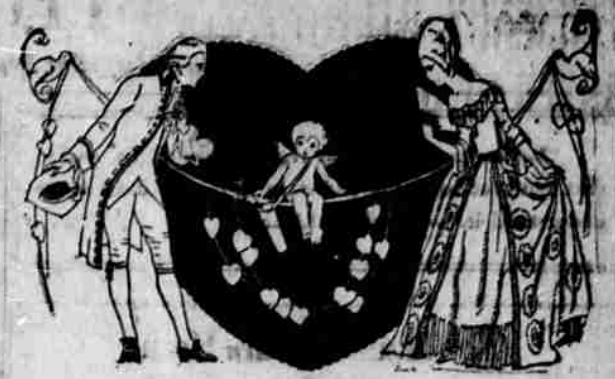
A. J. Voge in regard to the arrival

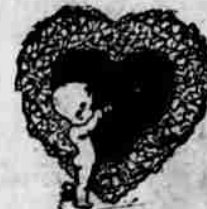
