EDDIE HUFFMAN IS BEATEN BY SHARKEY

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Feb. 12. (United News)—A bit more aggressiveness and Jack Sharkey, a big Lithuanian from the effete hub, will be quite a good heavyweight.

Sharkey outpointed Eddie Huffman, the well press-agented ex-sailor from the Golden Gate in ten rounds Friday night before the smallest crowd that any fight has drawn to Madison Square Garden since the structure was built.

HEROIC SAILORS HONORED AT SEA

Str. Roosevelt Holds Service Near Point Where Men Gave Up Lives

AIRBORNE S. S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, Feb. 12. (United News)—Final honors were paid Wednesday to the memory of two fishermen, and Edward Heitman, members of the crew of the Roosevelt, who lost their lives in an attempt to rescue the crew of the disabled British freighter Audenoe. Amid a North Atlantic storm, impressively ceremonies were held near the spot where, two weeks ago, Wittenan and Heitman fought for the lives of the freighter's crew.

Bishop Hiram A. Dow, of Dallas, Texas, assisted by Father Louis Petroselli of Baltimore, conducted the service. This was followed by a eulogy of the two men by Captain George Fried of the Roosevelt, who joined the shipmates of the dead men in casting wreaths, bouquets and spring flowers upon the stormy sea.

Tia Juana Chief of Police Guilty

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 12. (United News)—Chief of Police Blanton of Tia Juana and Luis Amador, owner of the Oakland bar at the border resort, were directly responsible for the suicides of four members of the Thomas M. Petest family following an attack upon his two daughters, a coroner's jury decided here Friday.

Four verdicts in all were returned.

The Petest family, according to the verdicts, carried out a suicide pact because of shame over the attacks upon the two girls, Audrey, 15, and Clyde, 24.

Blanton and Amador were mentioned as having perpetrated the indignities after they had dragged the girls and their father in Amador's safe.

A number of witnesses at the coroner's inquest testified that attacks on American women were very common at Tia Juana.
