harrowing tales of the killer's work. Physicians said intense fear overburdened his heart.

Dr. Cora Johnston Best, famous explorer, lecturing here, said she would "rather climb Mount Victoria than walk the streets of Omaha at night." Her statement is expressive of the general fear the killer has inspired.

More than a hundred armed citizens are aiding police in patrolling the Creighton university section, where the maniac is believed to be in hiding.

Newspaper reporters believed they had uncovered an important clue when they came upon a small rifle range in the basement of a deserted apartment building. Twenty-two caliber shells and morsels of food were strewn about the floor. The crude target had been struck with dozens of bullets, indicating the rifleman's accuracy.

Police spent Friday night watching the building in the belief that it might be the slayer's headquarters. A Creighton university student said he saw a slightly stooped, little man leaving the empty flats with a rifle in two parts.

SEVENTH REGIMENT ARMORY. New York, Feb. 19. (United News)—The "three musketeers" of France have delivered a smashing blow to American tennis supremacy.

William T. Tilden, II, has sustained his first defeat in seven years in a national championship.

Three French tennis stars swept the boards of the seventh Regiment armory Friday afternoon in the indoor singles matches, completely eliminating America's leading players.

John Borotra, lithe and debonaire ace of the invaders, lowered the colors of "Big Bill" Tilden in straight sets, the national singles champion losing his first important match since 1919.

All the French victories in the singles were achieved in the same brilliant and speedy manner. Rene Lacoste defeated Vincent Richards, 6-4, 6-2, and Jacques Brugnon beat Francis T. Hunter, 6-4, 6-4. Borotra's victory over Tilden followed the most gruelling first set ever witnessed in a national indoor championship, the youthful Hasque finally winning 13-11. After this "Big Bill" weakened materially before the slashing attack of the French star and Borotra quickly ran out the second set 6-3.

become a real state, viewed from a railroad viewpoint! Oregon has one line across the state, that along the Columbia, while every other state in the west has three or four trans-state lines. We need them if Oregon is to progress and take its place. The Interstate Commerce commission has a serious problem here.

In deciding whether to order a railroad to build about 120 miles of line, as it will establish a precedent, but I feel satisfied that there is to be much railroad construction in Oregon, that the state will be crossed by several railroads and that once these are built that the state will move forward. With all the pine timber in Klamath and Lake counties, Klamath Falls cannot help being the big central lumber point, and I've been predicting this for two years and it will come true.
