

TEST DIRIGIBLE FOR POLE TRIP

Amundsen Lighter Than Air Machine gets First Try-out Today

ROME, Feb. 26.—(United News)—Roald Amundsen's Italian dirigible will have its first trial Saturday in preparation for a flight to the pole tentatively fixed for April 31st.

It will carry Amundsen and his American partner, Lincoln Ellsworth, on their second aerial venture into the Arctic. The first journey began at Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, on May 21, 1925, and for nearly a month the entire civilized world thought the explorers had perished in the ice. On June 18 Amundsen and his six companions arrived at their starting place after a harrowing experience which nearly resulted in their deaths.

Commander Nobile and the entire polar crew of sixteen, with the exception of Amundsen and Ellsworth, will be aboard the airship on her first flight.

Lieut. H. Rissor Larson and Lieut. Oskar Omdahl, members of last year's unsuccessful flight, will be the only non-Italian persons aboard.

Ship Improved.
The ship has been improved and altered as her construction progressed. It is impossible to list the new features which she will float to Rome. The crew will be drilled in bringing the ship to earth. If Saturday's tests are successful the ship probably will make a long flight to southern Italy, and during the latter part of March depart for Norway, via Leningrad.

From Rome to Oslo, the ship will fly the Italian flag, but in the Norwegian capital she will be christened the "Norge I" and will receive the Norwegian colors, which are to be carried into the Arctic. Queen Maude or Norway will christen the ship.

Although April 31 is set for the hop-off from Kings Bay, it is not likely that the schedule will be followed exactly. Almost a month of waiting for proper atmospheric conditions was necessary last year when Amundsen led his two planes into the north. His difficulties last spring convinced the explorer that for Arctic flying airplanes were useless.

before Justice Emmitt in the Gaskell case. It is alleged that the officers saw two ten-gallon kegs of moonshine taken from a car driven by Gaskell and another man, who escaped.

Bad Blood Exists.
The writ and petition against Justice Spink was filed by Attorney Wm. Marx, between whom much bad blood exists. The application for the writ sets forth that Justice Spink has manifested prejudice by continuing to refuse to permit Marx to examine the record in the Hiland case, and prays that the circuit court order the case transferred to the Linkville district for the added reason that it will be for the convenience of witnesses.

The petition asking that Justice Spink be cited for contempt tells that the justice told Marx to shut his mouth and to keep it shut, as the court had ordered the attorney, was not in a position to gain the privilege of seeing the records in the Hiland case. The justice had been ordered by a peremptory writ to give Marx access to the records. Hiland is not in custody as yet. Marx said that he would produce him in court as soon as a fair trial was assured.

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NEW BOY SCOUT EXECUTIVE HERE

Beryl Blevens of Pocatello Has Comprehensive Plan For Work Here

Beryl Blevens, newly elected scout executive of Klamath county, arrived in Klamath Falls Wednesday afternoon to take charge of the local troops. Blevens comes highly recommended to Klamath Falls from Pocatello, Idaho, where he has been working with scout troops. He has been interested in scout work for the past six years, three years professionally.

"We are calling a meeting Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the chamber of commerce to organize a first class council. We want men from the luncheon clubs, social organizations, fraternities, churches and business men to attend the meeting and to help in the election of the council. From the council there will be named an executive board that will take care of all matters pertaining to the council," said Blevens last night.

Following the organization of the council it is hoped that a program for the coming summer may be worked out immediately in order to lay plans for the summer camp. Another feature of Blevens' plan for the year includes scout leader's training program. Troops will be organized throughout the county as soon as trained men are available. There will be organizations in the churches and schools as well.

"We hope to standardize the uniform of the Klamath scouts in the near future," stated Blevens. "Of course all this will follow our organization of the men and the court of honor and the departments of that."
