

ADDED REVENUE AVAILABLE FOR U. S. TREASURER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(United Press)—The government's financial situation took an unexpected turn tonight when it was learned authoritatively that treasury officials are confident of an increase of \$20,000,000 or more in revenues, despite the \$387,000,000 tax reduction.

The development contrasted sharply with President Coolidge's pessimistic announcement that there could be no tax reduction next year, coupled with his statement that appropriation measures being seriously considered by congress would cause a \$100,000,000 deficit at the end of the fiscal year, 1927.

The present considerable degree of industrial prosperity, together with the theory of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and other tax experts that lower rates bring in larger revenues, both are contributing factors to the expected increase in revenue.

Expect Increase

Receipts of income taxes are expected to jump nearly \$10,000,000 despite the lower normal and surtax rates, which went into effect yesterday, when the president signed the measure passed by congress 80 days ago.

Last year's collections were about \$1,700,000,000 in income taxes. Miscellaneous taxes will bring in about \$950,000,000 this year, compared with \$822,000,000 last year, and \$954,000,000 in 1924. It is estimated.

In 1927 the tax reduction which is just going into effect will be felt more severely by the government, although the reduction will amount to only about \$34,000,000 in that and subsequent years.

Receipts for later years will probably decline around \$20,000,000, due to smaller collections of miscellaneous taxes.

The treasury is planning a new series of treasury bonds to be issued between now and March 15, to meet maturing securities of more than \$600,000,000 and to provide funds for current expenses and interest payments.

Langell Boosts Community Hall

A petition asking that the Langell valley irrigation district build a meeting and exhibit hall for the use of the district is being circulated by H. J. Ticknor and other members of the district.

The district has been using an abandoned school house, but the plan is now to build a small but attractive building to cost about \$1600 which can be used to transact the business of the irrigation district.

EX-PRESIDENT'S WIFE PLEADS FOR SERVANT

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(United Press)—Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, widow of President Harrison, pleaded with Magistrate McKirney today to be lenient toward her maid, Anna Bernhardt, charged with grand larceny.

The 67-year-old widow had brought about the girl's arrest after theft of valuable jewelry, but her heart softened when the girl begged for "another chance."

Magistrate McKirney said he could not grant clemency, however, and placed the girl under \$2500 bail for the action of the grand jury.

VETERAN PAROLED.

PORTLAND, Feb. 27.—(United Press)—A judicial decision, tempered with mercy, was handed down here today by Federal Judge Wolverton, when John M. Scheibe, disabled war veteran, was paroled to the veterans' hospital at Tacoma, Wash., for two years.

Scheibe was indicted by the federal grand jury for forging two United States treasury notes. A physician's report showed that Scheibe was not well, so he was ordered into a hospital instead of jail.

HARVARD WINS MEET.

BOSTON, Feb. 27.—(United Press)—Harvard shattered two records and tied another here tonight when its indoor track team won the seventh annual triangular track meet with Dartmouth and Cornell by piling up a total of 59 points.

Dartmouth was second with 30½, while Cornell was third, getting 26½.

CASHIER SAVES COMPANY FUNDS

Plucky Girl Wrestles With Purse Snatcher and Summons Aid

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(United News)—A daring daylight holdup was thwarted today by Miss Edna Valck, cashier for the J. C. English company, when a bandit attempted to snatch the bag containing the company's weekly payroll.

Miss Valck evidently was followed from the bank, where she obtained \$500.

As she ascended the stairs to the firm's office a young man seized the bag.

She lunged to it, uttering piercing screams as the man dragged her down 21 marble stairs to the street. Money dropped from the bag, but both Miss Valck and the bandit hung on to the container.

When the street level was reached two men seized the bandit, but he tore away and escaped.

S. P. Adds 23 New Locomotives

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27.—The Southern Pacific railroad has just placed an order for the construction of 23 three cylinder Southern Pacific type locomotives, according to announcement today by Wm. Sprague, president of the company. The locomotives which will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000 will be built by American Locomotive company at Schenectady, N. Y.

Under the contract entered into with the builders, these locomotives will be completed and turned over to Southern Pacific by May 31, 1926, which will make it possible to have them in service before the peak of heavy traffic in the late summer and fall months. The locomotives are of the type first placed in service by Southern Pacific in 1925, when 16 were obtained. They are the most powerful and economical non articulated locomotives yet designed and are used to handle heavy trains over mountain sections in the west.

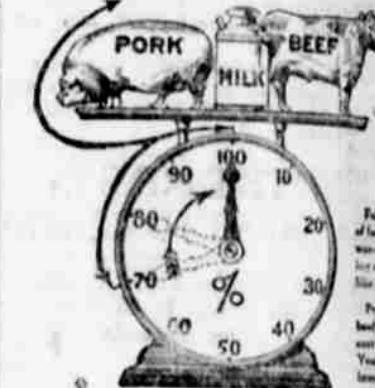
