Allen Tupper Wilkes is the author, and in the program the producer has made an attempt to apologize for the play's grotesqueness by pretending that he knew it was ridiculous all the time.

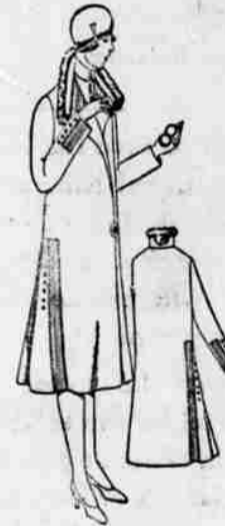
