

FARM RELIEF ACT NOT EXPECTED IN PRESENT SESSION

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(United News)—While representatives of eleven middle western governors are pleading with congress for farm relief, senators and representatives of those states are growing more pessimistic regarding the outlook for desired legislation.

The agricultural delegation, the outgrowth of the recent Des Moines conference, Friday presented to the house agricultural committee a definite program for relief which was said to embody more closely than any other proposal the wishes of the middle west.

Roughly, this program was in line with wishes expressed previously by the delegation—a measure based on the principle of the Dickinson bill.

Bloc Loses Power.

The Dickinson bill, however, goes much further than the administration cares to venture. There appears little hope that senators and representatives most interested in such legislation can fight successfully such odds. In recent years the so-called agricultural bloc maintained its strength through threats of an alignment with Democratic forces. But with the administration claiming sufficient Democratic votes the Progressive-Republican group no longer holds a balance of power, and until the situation changes, the administration can ignore the agricultural element.

The delegation before the house committee recommended the adoption by congress of the following policy:

Orderly Marketing.

"To promote the orderly marketing of agricultural commodities in domestic and foreign trade; to enable producers of farm products to stabilize their markets against undue and excessive fluctuations; to encourage the organization of producers of agricultural commodities and co-operative associations; to minimize speculation and waste in the marketing of agricultural commodities; to protect domestic markets against the influence of world price by providing for the control and disposition of domestic surpluses of all agricultural commodities."

rifles, revolvers and sawed off shot-guns. They began firing almost as soon as they were inside. I remember seeing three girls faint before I ducked down behind a desk.

Broke Into Cage.

The leader, who wore a mask, seemed to know his way about the place. He went straight for the glass cage and smashed in one side of it with the butt of his shotgun. Then he picked up the big cash box and started toward a window. He broke the window, using the butt of his gun again, and stepped out with the loot. The others followed him.

"I was watching everything from behind the desk. As soon as the last robber was out I ran to the cage and grabbed a revolver. Johnson and Daffey did the same. When we reached the window the bandits were just pulling away in two automobiles. We sent a lot of bullets after them but I don't think any of them struck home."

Detective squads took up pursuit of the bandits. They learned that one of the automobiles had been stolen.

All of the three major hold-ups of the day occurred at approximately the same time. Detective headquarters was the scene of wild excitement with flashes coming in from widely separated parts of the city, and motor squads hurrying out in response to them. These were followed by reports that the bandits had been seen fleeing through the

streets of the north, west and south sides and this only added to the confusion.

The carnival of crime is expected to give impetus to the Better Government association's plan to demand a special prosecutor and grand jury to investigate outlaws here.

VOTE ON McCAMANT

WASHINGTON, March 5.—That the nomination of Wallace McCamant for judge of the United States circuit court of appeals will be taken up next week by the senate judiciary committee is the word that comes from members of that committee today, the first indication of a movement to bring the question of his confirmation to a decision.

The committee's regular meeting is on Monday, but it is not believed that McCamant's case will be considered then.

PERUVIANS IN FIGHT.

ARICA, March 5.—(United News)—Street fighting in which two Peruvians were reported seriously wounded and a score slightly hurt occurred in Tacna Friday evening, when 159 Peruvians arrived from Arica by special train were greeted by several hundred of their countrymen already in Tacna.

The Peruvians paraded toward the residential section, carrying their national flag and led by a band. Chileans are alleged to have stoned them, whereupon ensued a free-for-all fight.
