

Woman Candidate for Gov. Against A Woman's Party

PORTLAND, March 6.—(United Press)—There is plenty room for women in existing political organizations, according to Mrs. Louise Palmer Webber, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of Oregon, who tonight scored attempts being made by certain women to establish a "woman's party."

"Forming such a party would be foolish," said Mrs. Webber, when interviewed by a United Press representative. "The two major parties have control of the political situation, and reform must come from within. There is a diversity of issues in these organizations. Women can best serve in American political life by working as Americans."

In proving her assertion that women have political ability, Mrs. Webber called attention to the first women governors, Miriam A. Ferguson of Texas, and Nellie Ross of Wyoming.

"Governor Ferguson started with a tremendous handicap," Mrs. Webber pointed out. "She was weighed down by the past record of her husband and it required much of her time and energy to offset it. But Mrs. Ross launched her political career with no such handicap, and all Americans, men and women, may well be proud of her record."

MOTHER DIES IN RESCUING BABES

Children are Rescued from Blazing Farm Home But Mother Is Caught

PORTLAND, March 6.—(United Press)—Mrs. Dolly Bram, 47, saved the lives of her children but lost her own in a fire which destroyed the family home near Springdale Saturday.

Peculiar circumstances caused authorities to investigate, but they learned that the fatal fire came upon the family unexpectedly.

According to the story told by F. E. Bram, the husband, he had built a fire in the stove and then went out to milk cows. About 30 minutes later he saw fire shooting from the house. He ran to the door and with the assistance of a neighbor thought he had extinguished the flames. The three children had been awakened by Mrs. Bram, who then was missing. She was found near the children's bed on the second floor.

Guard Foreigners in China War Zone

TIENSIN, March 6.—(United Press)—Shops are closed and barricaded and a careful guard is watching over the foreign population as bands of straggling refugees from the armies of General Peng Yeh-shang fall back on this city.

The day was filled with rumors of the battle which is going on to the south of Machang and of the impending battle planned by the forces of General Chang Tso-lin in the north. Foreign guards are doing all night and day duty against a possible outbreak of trouble.

The forces of Feng, the "Christian general" and alleged friend of bolshevik Russia, are facing defeat at Machang.

DEBATE APPOINTMENT

The matter of the appointment of an administratrix for the estate of Amberline Yearsley who died here February 1 was debated by attorneys Fay Morris and John Irwin with considerable heat, before the county court yesterday.

Morris claimed that Lillie Corson, a daughter, who succeeded in having herself appointed, was not acceptable to the other heirs, Zene-phone Yearsley the husband and six other children. The court ruled the appointment would stand.

Owner may prove property and pay legal claims and take animals, otherwise they will be sold according to law.

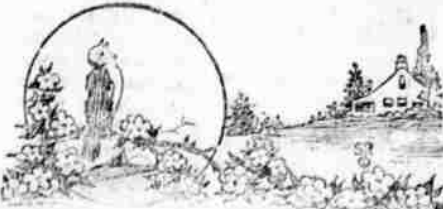
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Alien Charges to Face Deportation

DENVER, March 6.—(United Press)—Following the passage of a bill by congress last month ordering federal immigration officials to make a check of all prisons, reform schools and eleemosynary institutions to determine the number of aliens in them, work in this federal district has been started.

William R. Mansfield, commissioner of immigration in the district under jurisdiction of the Denver office said that no figures were yet available as the work had just begun.

Mansfield said that should it be found that any aliens in the institutions could, under the law, be deported such action would be insisted upon.

PILFERED KISS AT BIG FIGURE

Woman Tenant Sues Landlord for \$50,000 for Indecretion

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—(United Press)—A record valuation on one kiss was established here today when Mary Alice Bloomer filed suit for \$50,000 against her former landlord, L. M. Dornberg.

Miss Bloomer's complaint hinged mainly on the alleged pilfered kiss. Landlord forced his way into her apartment and forcibly enacted the osculation, she claims.

Simultaneous action for another \$50,000, naming Dornberg and F. L. Bridgewater was filed by Miss Bloomer, alleging malicious prosecution.

The girl charged Dornberg and Bridgewater made an affidavit she was insane and had her confined ten days in the psychopathic ward of the county hospital.

THEATER CROWD ESCAPES BOMB

Picture Operator Tosses Infernal Machine Out Of Minn. Theatre

MINNEAPOLIS, March 6.—(United Press)—An attempt to bomb a neighborhood theater here while 230 persons were watching the performance was frustrated tonight by a motion picture operator who tossed the machine out of the building just as the burning wick set off the explosive.

Windows of the theater and other nearby buildings were shattered, but no one was injured.

This was the second attempt to destroy the moving picture house within a year. On both occasions Frank Oliver, the operator, discovered the bombs and by quick action averted disaster.

The first time Oliver was able to extinguish the wick, but tonight it persisted in eating its way toward the bomb, despite his efforts to stamp it out in the snow.
