

Mother of Three at 22 Accused of Slaying Husband and Babes



Mrs. Bernette Bessy, wedded at 16, mother of three at 22, a widow bereft of husband and entire brood at 25, is under arrest in New Orleans, charged specifically with poisoning her eldest child, Verdia, 5, and accused informally of the deaths of the three other members of her family. All of the allegations she denies. She is seen being taken from jail to attend the funeral of Verdia.

NEIGHBORS OPEN ROAD FOR PRES.

PLYMOUTH, Vt., March 10.—(United News)—Following a change for the worse in the condition of Colonel John Coolidge, scores of Plymouth residents, armed with shovels, began Wednesday the work of opening the snowdrifted road between here and Ludlow. The project was undertaken on recommendation of Dr. Albert M. Cram, the colonel's physician, who pointed to the fact that President Coolidge might be summoned from Washington at any time. Under conditions which had existed for the past few weeks, it would have been virtually impossible for the president to get from Ludlow to this town. Some sections of the ten-mile stretch of road were blanketed beneath about eight feet of snow and the average depth was more than four feet.

Fight Measure to Increase Numbers on I. C. C. of U. S.

SALEM, Ore., March 10.—(United News)—The public service commission Tuesday night telegraphed the Oregon delegation in congress urging them to oppose the passage of the measure providing for the increase of the membership of the interstate commerce commission to 13 and their selections by districts. The Oregon commission is especially opposed to the provision relative to the selection of the interstate body personnel by districts, inasmuch as it "would prove very detrimental to the best interests of Oregon and would make ineligible for appointment or reappointment many able men, including Commissioner Aitchison of Oregon."

Palatial Jail No Good Is Verdict

LOS ANGELES, March 10.—(United News)—Although it has been occupied only three weeks the \$6,000,000 Los Angeles county jail should be reconstructed, a coroner's jury recommended here Tuesday.

The verdict was reached after an inquest over the body of Natalie Carradi, 18, who fell to his death while trying to escape from his tenth floor cell.

The jury also urged that additional guards be placed on duty at the palatial prison, where eight captives have escaped in five recent outbreaks.

The luxurious bastille was pronounced "escape proof" when it was first occupied three weeks ago.
