

Storms to Prevent Coolidge Visiting His Infirm Father

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(United News)—Wintery conditions in the mountains of Vermont will prevent President Coolidge from visiting his aged father, unless Colonel John Coolidge's illness takes a more serious turn.

A spokesman for the president Friday said that Vermont was in the midst of a hard winter and that travel there would be practically impossible except by sleight or snowshoes.

This situation would greatly hinder the passage of the presidential party and would make communication with the outside world extremely difficult. The president has made every effort to bring Colonel Coolidge here, but the latter refused to leave the old homestead to spend the winter months in Washington.

Score Mounts Up Against McCamant

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(United News)—The score against Wallace McCamant, the president's nominee for the United States circuit court of appeals, is running up in the senate judiciary committee.

When the vote was taken on the question of confirmation Thursday it stood 8 to 3, one answering "present," with agreement that the four absentees would be permitted to record themselves.

Today the poll stands 10 to 3, with two members standing mute, and one yet unheard from. It is understood the committee will wait until Saturday to hear from Gillette of Massachusetts, who is still unrecalled and will then prepare its adverse report for presentation to the senate.

TRAINING VITAL

PALO ALTO, Cal., March 12.—(United News)—The day of the "self made man" is gone.

Addressing a conference on business matters under the auspices of Stanford university, David P. Houston, former secretary of agriculture, and now president of the Bell Telephone and Securities company, declared Thursday that college trained men are vital to the business world.

"The business man with college training will advance faster and farther than the man who acquires knowledge solely through experience," he said. "It is a day of co-operation and not one of single-handed successes."

QUAKE CAUSES PANIC

LIMA, Peru, March 12.—(United News)—One of the severest earthquake shocks in the past decade created a near panic in the entire district surrounding Lima and in the Peruvian capital Thursday.

Thousands of people rushed from their homes and from hotels. Landslides are reported at fifteen different points on the central railway as a result of the quake.

PARSON OFFERS BOOZE OR BOY

Texas Minister in Rum Fight to Auction Contraband

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 12.—(United News)—Into the maelstrom of the acrimonious discussion of prohibition the Rev. Melvin C. Eldson, pastor of the Beacon Hill Baptist church of San Antonio will make a high dive from his pulpit next Sunday, holding a bottle of booze in one hand and a blushing boy in the other.

He expects to be arrested for it. With an eye on page one, the Rev. Eldson announced Friday that he would begin a drive against liquor violations, and to get a running start, would auction off a boy and a bottle of booze to the members of his congregation.

"Is booze worth more than a boy?" cries the minister and the words resound throughout the city, beating with particular force upon the ears of the members of the local W. C. T. U.

"I'll find out," adds the Rev. Eldson. "I'll auction them off."

Expects Arrest

"If you do you'll get a free ride in a patrol wagon," commented several prominent club women when they heard of his expressed intention.

"Oh, I've already reserved quarters in the jail and I double-dog-dare anybody to arrest me," responded the minister. "I'll be there (in his pulpit) with a bottle in my left hand. I'm opening a campaign against drinking in San Antonio, and nothing like a jail sentence will stop me."

Members of one faction of the W. C. T. U. have informed the minister that they are behind him in full strength, and that if he gets into jail they'll get him out.

According to Mrs. H. A. Moos, chairman of the law enforcement department of the W. C. T. U., she said she had received many telephone calls Friday from persons who wanted to know why the Rev. Eldson would not be classed with any ordinary liquor offender if he should be found with liquor in his possession.

"Regardless of that point," she said, "The W. C. T. U. is back of him with all its strength and if he is arrested I am authorized to say that certain members of our organization, as a protest will request that cells be reserved for them also."

NEVERS TRIES OUT

TARPON SPRINGS, Fla., March 12.—(United News)—George Siler will try out a reconstructed infield when his St. Louis Browns meet the Brooklyn Robins at Clearwater Saturday. In addition to placing Ernie Nevers, California gridiron star on the mound for a trial, Bob Lamotte will be used at short, while Oscar Melillo, for whom the Browns are said to have paid Milwaukee \$20,000 in cash and \$35,000 in players, will play second.

Jap Congress Is Scene of Brawl

HONOLULU, March 12.—A midnight riot in the Japanese diet, with fistful clashes resulting in injuries and bloodshed, is described in a Tokyo dispatch to Hoichi Sha, Japanese newspaper here.

The fight between the opposition factions was caused by efforts of the Seifukai party to impeach Nakano, government deputy, as a traitor and paid spy of soviet Russia. This action followed Nakano's accusation that Baron Tanaka, president of the opposition party, was guilty of embezzling 2,500,000 yen while minister of war during the world war.

Fearing further outbreaks the chamber of deputies suspended its session Friday, the dispatch stated.

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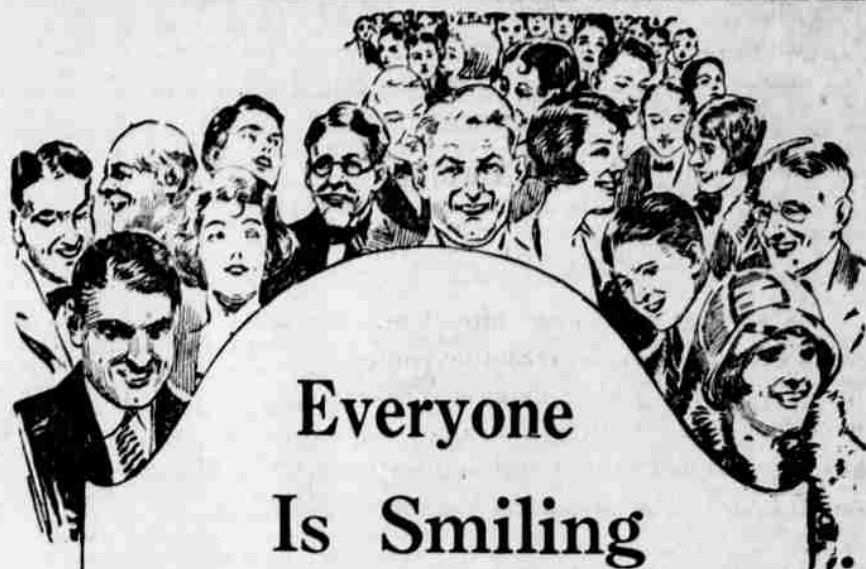
