CONGRESS TAKES UP RADIO RULES

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(United News)—Legislation designed to protect the long-suffering radio fan has been passed by the house and now goes to the senate.

The White bill, which was passed Monday by a vote of 218 to 124, seeks to regulate radio so that every fan who listens in will have the best service possible and be protected against evils which develop in the air.

The department of commerce will appoint a committee of five representing five geographical divisions of the country.

The bill contains provisions to protect the public against these evils:

1—Monopoly of radio apparatus, which might bring exorbitant prices for sets and parts of sets.

2—Radio "posts" such as have interfered in the past with legitimate broadcasting, or have transmitted false distress signals.

3—Inefficient broadcasters. The bill also requires that paid advertising broadcast, an announcement must be made to this effect and the name of the firm paying for the service must be given.

It is presumed that the ordinary laws against slander and libel apply to radio but the question has never been presented to the courts. Blanton wanted to make it certain by a provision in the bill.

MAIL CARRIERS TO HAVE EXAMS

The United States Civil Service commission announces a post office clerk-carrier examination for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk or carrier, post office service, at Klamath Falls, Oregon. Salary is \$1700 per annum (for first year at full time); substitute service is paid at the rate of 65c per hour. Applications will be received by the Secretary, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service District, Seattle, Washington, up to the close of business on May 5, 1926. The date of examination will be shown on the admission cards furnished applicants.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits, 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.
