

COAST BASEBALL FACES GOOD YEAR

LOS ANGELES, March 20.—This year the Pacific Coast league will have much that is new to offer, many new faces on the field, both players and umpires, a new club owner, two new names among the clubs—Mission and Hollywood—two new managers, Ernie Johnson of Portland and Walter McCredie of the Missions, and a new arrangement of the circuit.

Also there is a new baseball park in Los Angeles, and the plan of opening is now, Seattle starting the season in Portland, the Seattle opening to follow one week later with Portland as the visiting club. This, as far as I can recall in my more than fifteen years' association with baseball on the coast, is the first time there has been an opening in the northwest contemporaneous with the opening in California, and

gives an added touch of interest in the early season events.

Johnson and McCredie are the bustling type of manager, and both have previously demonstrated their ability in Coast League company.

The Coast league circuit is now on a sound ground and practical geographical basis. The league has been adjusted on a basis of equity and with a clear understanding on the part of all parties. The Coast league is now grounded on unshakable baseball fundamentals. In short, from now on the game is the thing.

Baseball continues the beloved game of the masses of America. Only a few years ago some of the world series games were played before partly filled stands. Today the big modern baseball stadiums are proving inadequate. Baseball is as much in the blood of Americans as are the red corpuscles.

Because of its clarity and its endless variations, baseball is incomparable from the spectator's standpoint, and I am certain that every citizen will welcome the command "play ball" in the Coast league, which, as usual, will be the first to usher in the nation's pastime.

U. S. to Develop Pulp Paper in Alaska Forests

DENVER, March 20.—(United Press)—Extensive development of the pulp paper industry is planned by the United States government in Alaska, according to George A. Parks, governor of the territory, who is spending a couple of days with his parents here.

Governor Parks has been in Washington for two months, conferring with Secretary of the Interior Work.

"The forests of Alaska are capable of a sustained output of 1,200,000 tons of paper pulp each year," declared Parks. "Twenty million acres of national forests, or about 11 per cent of the forests owned by the government are in Alaska, and it is planned to sell a yearly crop of timber to private interests."
