FELT HATS LOSING SPRING POPULARITY

Perhaps the most interesting thing in millinery at the present time is the controversy that is going on in the trade on the subject of "hat consciousness." There has been a great deal of talk regarding the supremacy of the felt during the past season and the query as to whether it will continue to rule as despotically as before.

Manufacturers and retail buyers who have just returned from Paris have much to say regarding this. Very evidently the same feeling is beginning to stir in the Paris market, for the French milliners are realizing that they cannot do business with American buyers if they continue to show them the same simple little hat that may change only the draps of the crown or the slash of the brim for a new season.

The felt hat will be the correct thing for the sports costume but that it will not be correct for the theatre, afternoon and restaurant wear as it has in the past.

A Tendency Toward Straws.

New hats which are arriving from Paris demonstrate this tendency. Much more is being done with straws and with fabrics than in many seasons, and it is thought by many in the trade that this spring and summer will see the largest demand for straw hats that the trade has experienced in some time.

All of the crochet straws and the perle straw bodies are listed for large use and of course ballbuntings is extremely good with the high-class trade.

The beret type is still considered a good item, although the latest hats to arrive from Paris show the draping of the beret so snug to the crown that it almost becomes a toque. Rebour is using the beret of this sort with a black velvet and straw.

Ineering construction problems to eliminate grades, are to be worked out in San Francisco. After which the costs will be considered. It is estimated that the viaduct will cost in the neighborhood of \$160,000.

Yards which the Southern Pacific proposes to build in Klamath Falls, together with shops, will necessitate a fill of considerable extent, and much of the dirt will come from the heavy cuts that will be necessary if the grade out of Klamath Falls is to be eliminated in order to avoid use of a helper engine. The grade is now the heaviest on the line between Weed and Eugene.

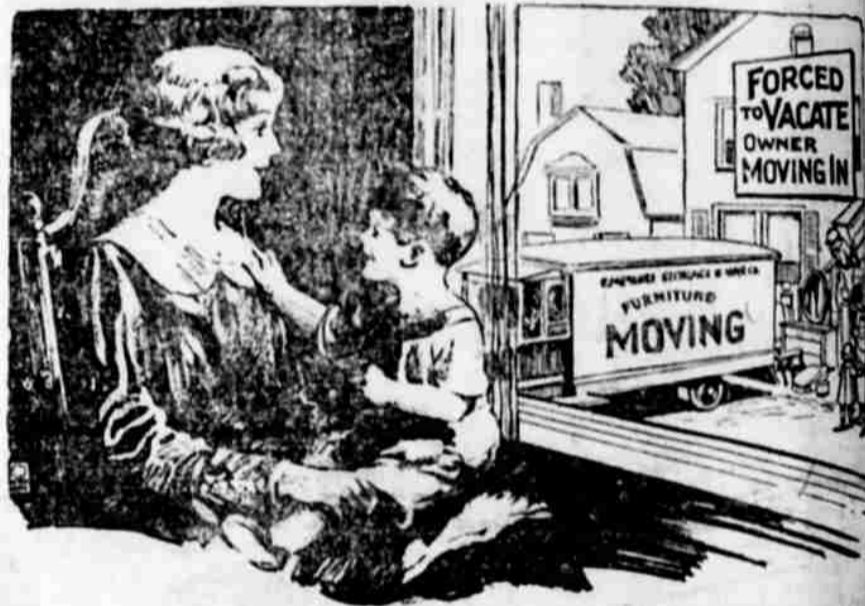
