

PRINCE SUFFERS ROYAL EAR ACHE

LONDON, March 31.—(United News)—Nursing an ear that resembled more than anything else the cauliflowered appendage of a battered prizefighter, the prince of Wales chafed Monday night over prospect of a week's delay of his vacation trip to Biarritz.

While the prince's condition was considered satisfactory enough, he was said to be suffering considerable discomfort as a result of his operation early Monday.

The royal patient had been looking forward for some time to his vacation. He had planned to take only one bachelor equerry with him to Biarritz.

Unusually inclement weather for this season of the year is one of the causes of the Prince of Wales' illness, according to his physicians. Members of the royal family are particularly susceptible to colds. The Prince of Wales continued to keep a heavy list of engagements on his return from South America. He went about his daily exercises with his usual Rooseveltian vigor, and as a result his strength was considerably weakened.

The report that he was suffering from influenza came as a surprise to his friends, for in appearance the prince was in his usually fit condition.

Borah Would Probe Japanese Colonies

WASHINGTON, March 31.—(United News)—Senator Borah has announced his intention of calling together the foreign relations committee to consider reports that Japanese were acquiring land in Lower California for colonization purposes. Inquiry into reports of colonization plans for Japan was asked by Senator Johnson, California Republican.

"It would be premature to comment now, but the reports deal with a grave and important matter," Johnson said. "I should like to have the foreign relations committee find out as soon as possible if the reports are true."

Meantime the house foreign affairs committee Tuesday will give consideration to the Boylan resolution, calling for suspension of relations with Mexico.

MARGARET WILL NOT PROSECUTE

Daughter of Late President Refuses to Sign Theft Complaint

NEW YORK, March 31.—(United News)—When the late Woodrow Wilson set his jaw and fought for a principle something had to give way, and it almost never was the president.

Now his daughter, Margaret, has shown a flash of that same determination to stick to a point in the face of logic, argument and what others insist is common sense.

Miss Wilson flatly refused to sign a complaint Monday to a policeman against two boys who had ransacked her apartment.

"I don't want these boys prosecuted. A conviction would stand in the way of their going straight for a lifetime," said the daughter of the former president.

In vain the authorities pointed out to her that one of the burglars, Joseph Moriglia, had a previous conviction for burglary against his record and that the other, Anthony Munziato, was wearing stolen cufflinks, part of the loot of another robbery, when arrested. The boys are 17 and 16 years of age, respectively.

"I don't care what the records show," said Miss Wilson. "They probably belonged to a crowd that were led astray. They cannot judge right from wrong. Like older people."

Radical Line-Up to Save Briand

PARIS, March 31.—(United News)—Edouard Herriot, former premier and leader of the radicals, has moved to save the Briand government and the financial measures of Minister of Finance Raoul Peret.

Postponement of the chamber of deputies on the government's financial measures from Tuesday night until Wednesday, followed a strong declaration by Herriot, who asserted that actual circumstances make it impossible for the radical party to refuse the Briand government support in its efforts to solve the financial problems.

The intervention of Herriot, who is president of the chamber, led to the immediate switch of more votes to the support of Raoul Peret. It has caused claims of a paper majority of 20 for the Briand-Peret measures when they come up for the final vote Wednesday.
