Final Flurry of Snow in Missouri

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 2.—(United News)—The worst of the five day downpour of snow which blanketed over Kansas City and the adjacent territory is definitely over.

Snow flurries were persistent here late Friday, but warm temperatures were quickly reducing them to trickling streams and it is possible that Easter Sunday will be wet but not white. Officials at the weather bureau here declared that winter's last and most vicious rally has ended.

Since the snowfall began early Monday a total of 19 inches have fallen in Kansas City. This is the equivalent of 1.71 inches of rain and is of inestimable value to the crops.

In St. Joseph, Mo., more than 10 inches of snow fell, and out in the semi-arid stretches of Kansas prairie around Goodland and Dodge City fell during the last 24 hours. In some sections in Kansas light rains were reported Friday night.

ANOTHER FRENCH CRISIS LOOMING

PARIS, April 2.—(United News)—Opposition in the French senate to creation of oil and sugar monopolies may reopen immediately the temporarily ended French government crisis.

The senate's finance committee has recommended that the senate at its session Saturday return the oil and sugar monopolies measures to the chamber of deputies. The French commission has further suggested that the senate urge delay in enactment of the monopolies measures into law pending the study of the entire question of monopolies by a special commission. Strong opposition in the senate to the monopolies already exists and with the consecutive spirit there that is known to exist there is likelihood that the senate will follow its commission recommendations.

Disagreement between the senate and the chamber of deputies will in all probability postpone enactment of the Peret financial measures and may yet cause a downfall of the Briand government. The senate's commission has approved financial measures as passed by the chamber, even to the extent of passing the much opposed increase in the business turnover tax. Only minor changes have been made in the deputies' financial bill, except for the refusal by the senate commission to approve the monopolies measure. The danger in the situation was realized Friday afternoon, by Premier Aristide Briand. Upon hearing of the opposition by the senate commission to the monopolies, he hastily transferred the senators.

Both the premier and the senators with whom he talked, feared
