The United States civil service commission invites special attention to the fact that in examinations held recently in Klamath Falls, Oregon, and other cities throughout the country for physiotherapy aids and physiotherapy assistant to fill vacancies in St. Elizabeth's hospital, Washington, D. C., and in the field services of the veterans' bureau and the public health service, applicants were not secured in the number desired, and that these examinations will be held again. JAP POTATO KING LEAVES FORTUNE

OAKLAND, Calif., April 5.—A fortune of \$15,000,000 has been left by George Shima, Japanese "potato king."

Shima was one of the most picturesque characters California has known. He died March 27 after toiling through to riches in the face of obstacles that meant ruin for men of less persistence.

The full extent of Shima's wealth was shown when his will was filed for probate Monday in the Alameda county court. The bulk of the estate was left to three children.

Shima came to this country with \$1,000. He lost the money in unsuccessful ventures, but gained a solid foundation of experience. Starting all over again he went into the delta section of the San Joaquin and Sacramento rivers, specializing in the production of potatoes, but wisely rotating his crops.

Laboring from sunrise to sunset, saving his money and gradually expanding, Shima grew to be a power in the region. At first he rented land from American owners, but later he acquired property in the name of his children, American born. The alien land law was invoked in an attempt to show that Shima could not control property in California. The Japanese won out after carrying the case to the supreme court.

Shima was shrewd, clever and honest. It was said of him that he never gave or asked for written contracts, and that he never broke his word. In his later life he built hotels in central California cities, and made several gifts to the University of California.
