was able to afford to drink under prohibition conditions.

Many complained that working men tried to brew their own beer, but that the result was unwholesome and detrimental to health. Yet, they say, it was consumed in large quantities. One witness told of a community still where the neighbors contributed and received pro rata shares in the output. Men made a living, it was stated, going from house to house tending home made wine kegs.

### Become Breweries.

"There was plenty of distilled liquor, but seldom real beer," he said. "We found homes of the people had been turned into breweries and distilleries and were turning out dangerous concoctions, which if consumed to any extent would ruin the health of those who drank them. They all asked us if congress would ever realize that manufacture and sale of beer would make for true temperance. Women were also interested in such questions."

## BLAZING TANKER Baffles Rescue

Oil Tanker Burning in Lower Mississippi Menace to Navigation

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 9.—(United News)—The Mississippi river is still a sea of flame off Point-a-la-Hache.

The tanker Sylvanus, rammed in the fog of Thursday night by the tanker Thomas H. Wheeler, continues to throw a fountain fire on the waters, making the rescue of 29 seamen known to have drowned or perished in the flames next to impossible.

One more was added to the death toll of the O. T. Waring, which was wrecked Thursday by a series of explosions, while being repaired at drydock. This brings the casualties of the two disasters to 36 dead or missing, and 26 injured now in New Orleans hospitals, several of them are not expected to recover.

Only four of the Sylvanus' crew escaped unhurt.

Two additional tugs were sent down the river from New Orleans late Friday to fight the volcanic mass of fire and smoke emanating from the Sylvanus, which is now close to shore. The tugs Robert W. Wilmot and the Sipsey are already on the scene. The dock board fire tug Sampson, which is feeling its way through the flaming oil spread on the water, sent a message through Point-a-la-Hache to speed a night crew and relief provisions.

The Sylvanus, in her present condition, is a menace to navigation. The ship drifted five miles down river before she nosed into the bank and stuck fast, her entire fore section ablaze.

# ITALIAN DICTATOR GLOATS ON POMP

TRIPOLI, April 9.—(United News)—The fascist emblems and those of the ancient Romans stand side by side among the elaborate decorations for Premier Benito Mussolini's arrival here from Italy Sunday.

No emperor of consul of old Rome received greater homage in a triumphal entry to north Africa than that which will be given the Italian dictator when he treads the roads of ancient conquerors. Every detail of the welcome to be given Mussolini and his party has been perfected and the city eagerly awaits his coming.

The arrival of the Italian naval party will be heralded by the booming of guns and the ringing of church bells for ten minutes. When Mussolini steps ashore and arrives in the square before the governor's palace, the populace of the city will stand at attention for two minutes as a mark of respect to the Italian premier.

From the city of Tripoli well into the interior the native population has exhibited intense interest for plans for the important visit. Roads between Tripoli and outlying districts which Mussolini will visit have been receiving the finishing touches of improvement from workmen during the last few days.
