FIVE MORE DAYS LEFT FOR FILING

Prospective candidates for nomination by both the Republican and Democratic parties at the primary election of May 21, for offices to be filled at the general election in November, must qualify this week if they are to participate in the respective races.

Friday, April 16, is the last day, under the law, upon which candidates for nomination by the two major parties may file declarations of candidacy or nomination petitions with the secretary of state.

Portrait cuts and statements for publication in both Republican and Democratic party campaign pamphlets also must be in the hands of the secretary of state not later than Friday of this week and payment for this space must accompany the material to be published. April 16, also is the last day upon which statements for publication in these campaign pamphlets, opposing the nomination of any candidate, can be accepted. These statements must be signed and paid for at the time of their filing with the secretary of state.

Five More Days.
While April 16 is the last day for filing for state and district offices, April 21 is the last day that candidates may file for county offices.

To date William Lee, incumbent, Democrat, is the only candidate who has filed for the office of county assessor. It was thought for some time that William F. B. Chase, Bonanza Democrat, would file for the

office, but up until late yesterday afternoon he had taken no action.

Both Allen Sloan and Roy Orem have been mentioned frequently for the office of assessor. Neither, however, has filed their intentions. Sloan is former deputy clerk and served as deputy sheriff and Orem is serving at present as deputy superintendent of banks.

Whether or not H. H. Bunnell, county judge, will run again for the office he now holds, is not known. So far George Offield, Democrat, Merrill rancher, has filed his intentions and Fred A. Baker, Republican, has announced his intention of filing before the last day. Baker formerly served as superintendent of Klamath Indian Agency.

Horace Dunlap, Republican candidate and H. J. Tichner, Langell's Valley rancher, on the Democratic ticket, will have their names appear in the race for county commissioner.

E. B. Ashurst, local attorney, last night announced that he had filed his intentions of running for the office of district attorney, with Sam Koezer, secretary of state, several weeks ago. W. A. Wiest will have his name appear on the ballot for the same office on the Republican ticket. Ashurst is a Democrat.

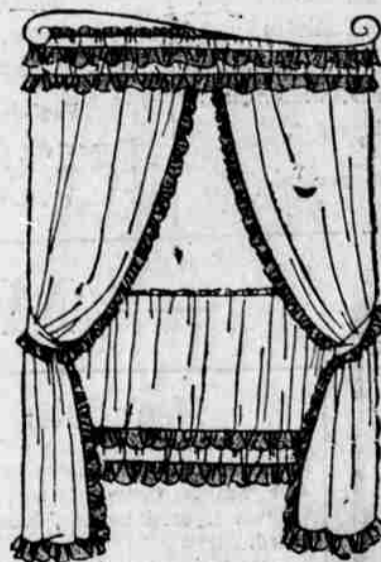
