

DICTATOR WANTS ROME RESTORED

ROME, April 20.—(United News)—Premier Mussolini's dream of a Rome restored to its ancient glories will see the beginning of fulfillment when this city, celebrating Wednesday the anniversary of its founding, undertakes the restoration work outlined by the dictator.

Nearly two thousand years after Rome's ancient glory, the people of the Italian capital will begin the demolition of slums and of buildings regarded as eyesores which are located near ancient monuments. Elaborate ceremonies will be held in the city which is already flag-decked and ready for celebration of the national anniversary. But to the fascists of Rome and to the population generally the anniversary will mean much more this year than it has in the past due to the fact that the restoration will date from this time.

It is the edict of Mussolini that "Rome must appear as a marvel to all the peoples of the world within a period of five years—a city vast, ordered and powerful as it was in the time of the first empire of Augustus."

The neighborhood where work will begin contains such ancient monuments as the Capitol, the Augustus amphitheatre and the Marcellus forum. Cheap modern buildings which have obscured many of the beauties of these buildings for years will be torn down. Excavations will be started to unearth the circus Maximus and ancient tombs. The ground in front of the Colosseum will be leveled so that this relic may be seen at better advantage.

Mount Lassen Is Erupting Again

REDDING, April 20.—(United News)—Mount Lassen, the only active volcano in the continental United States, was in eruption for an hour Tuesday afternoon.

A cloud of smoke, made black by ashes shot up with great force from the depths, ascended from the peak, rising vertically 1000 feet before the wind scattered it. The eruption came with great suddenness and ended almost as abruptly.

CHARGES DROPPED AT WIFE'S REQUEST

Bernie Duckett will not be tried in Klamath county courts charged with assault with intent to kill. Duckett, a Klamath rancher, was released yesterday afternoon from the county court house following the pleas of his wife who wished to defer all charges against her husband.

According to the sheriff's office, the wife wished to reconcile with her husband after she had previously applied for a divorce.

Duckett was arrested Sunday by Patrolman Reed, caught in the act of beating his wife, after he had told her he was going to drown her in Lake Ewanna.

BOXER FREE OF KILLING INTENT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 20.—(United News)—He was the gamest man I ever stood up against. I only wish that I'd been knocked out by his first punch.

Thus spoke Bud Taylor of Sencio Meldez, flashy little Filipino boxer who died Tuesday, a martyr to an unconquerable stamina which kept him on his feet through a hail of such terrific punishment that he was virtually unconscious, but fighting instinctively to the last.

After the bout was over the mid-gut flyweight had been examined by physicians who were not apprehensive as to his condition. But in his hotel, early Tuesday morning, Sencio died of an internal hemorrhage and was found lying in a pool of blood.

Two physicians, Dr. William Murphy and Dr. Edward I. Mioslach, made the post mortem examination, and announced the cause of death. No action will be taken against the Terre Haute, Ind., fighter. It was announced at the district attorney's office. Boxing is legal in Wisconsin and all the provisions of the law had been faithfully carried out. Both fighters had been examined by experts of the state boxing commission before and after the bout.

After he had been helped from the ring and fully revived, the Filipino's heart action and respiration were found to be normal.

Taylor was questioned by police and later visited the district attorney's office, but was informed that he had been fully exonerated.

Baby Boy Dies of Peritonitis

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Johnson, former residents of Eugene, suffered the tragic loss of their two-month-old baby boy yesterday afternoon from acute peritonitis, just as the family were driving into Klamath Falls, where they planned to make their future home.

The child had been ailing for some time and was two months and five days old at the time of death.

Funeral services under the auspices of the Salvation Army will be held at the Whitlock Funeral Home at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
