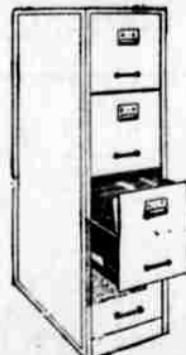

The picture will be shown in Malin Thursday night, Fort Klamath Friday and Bonanza Tuesday.

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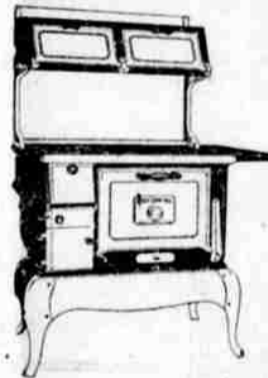
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
