

GREAT IOWA MEET PROMISES NEWER MARKS IN EVENTS

DES MOINES, April 22.—(United News)—Only J. Pluvius, who is likely to visit the 17th annual Drake relay, here Friday and Saturday, will have a chance of defeating half a dozen or more renowned athletes in their efforts to establish new world's records.

Charley Hoff of Norway, is going after his world's mark in the pole vault and expected to beat it by an inch or two.

In the 440 yard event, the University of Kansas, which sprinted the event in record time of 42 seconds this year will be out to uphold its honors. John Kuck, of Emporia, Kansas, Teachers' college, who put the shot 50 feet 3-4 inches, will be opposed by Clarence Houser of the University of Southern California, who tosses the ball and the discus equally well. The 100 yard dash ought to go to Roland Locke of Nebraska university, who equalled the world's mark of 9 3-5 seconds last week. There are other record breakers on the sport menu whose greatest opposition may be found in the much feared rain.

Northern Teams in Even Status

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—(United News)—The Sacramento Senators moved to within half a game of first place in the Pacific Coast league Thursday by defeating the leading Angels 5 to 4. It was the second Los Angeles defeat by one run in two days.

Portland and Mission engaged in a free hitting game here, each side using three hurlers. Mission won, 11 to 8, despite a Beaver rally which netted five runs, in the last three frames.

Seattle strengthened its hold on third place by winning over Hollywood in a tight game, 3 to 2. The Stars' defeat jolted them down into seventh place.

San Francisco, which seems to have swung into its real gait, downed Oakland, 5 to 1, Mitchell keeping the Oakland nine hits well scattered.

PIRATES LOST IN TEN INNINGS

Yanks Also Beaten in Ten Frames Marked by Long and Hard Hitting

The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped a 10 inning contest to St. Louis 5 to 3. Chick Hafey's home run, with Rogers Hornsby on base, cleared the left field wall and settled the issue.

Reb Morrison, who relieved Lee Meadows in the fifth, had been going along nicely, allowing but one hit to this point. Vic Keen pitched a good game for the winners, two errors in the second assisting Pittsburgh to make all their runs in that inning.

Elsewhere in both leagues, there were games which had these beaten for sensations and it appears that most of the teams have their second wind and are getting into their real pennant-chasing stride.

The Yankees dropped a ten inning 9-8 fracas to the Red Sox, in which 29 hits were gathered off six pitchers. Todd, the big Boston first sacker, hit two home runs, one in the tenth which won the game and Pat Collins, the Yankee catcher, brought his season's total to eight with a homer in the sixth.

Three home runs and 26 hits featured the White Sox 11-7 victory over the St. Louis Browns. Hargrave, the loser's catcher, getting two, and Falk of Chicago, another. Washington drove "Slim" Harriss of the Athletics from the hill in the fourth and disposed of Walberg similarly in the fifth, while "Dutch" Reuther worked along nicely for the Senators, who won 5 to 2. The Braves continued to show their home fans how good they are, taking another from the Phillies, 6 to 2.

Darkness ended the Reds-Cubs game in the eleventh, with the score 5-5. Joe McCarthy's men having batted Luque from the box in the ninth and tied the score.

As Cleveland did not play because of rain the Indians now lead the American league with a percentage of .714, the Yankees' defeat having cost them their tie for the top.

The Giants are even farther out in front in the National league as a result of the slaughter of Brooklyn.

Now that Pittsburgh and Brooklyn have observed their official home openings—both games, incidentally, resulting in defeat for the home team—the big leagues are through for a time with bands, parades, flag-raising and the business of having one in a silk hat throw in the first ball and can settle down to the business of serious baseball.

The good luck which favored six major league clubs who played their first game of 1926 on their home grounds Wednesday was complete when the world's champions and the Dodgers played the Cardinals and the Giants respectively.

Even the presence of the great "Dazzy" Vance, who has been suffering from boils, could not help Brooklyn. Vance apparently still is suffering. If his complaint no longer is boils it is base hits, for the Giants battered him from the box in the fifth inning, finishing with a total of 18 hits, and the score 11 to 4 in the visitors' favor.

Jack Scott, husky Giant veteran, was steaming along nicely without allowing the Dodgers a run until the seventh inning arrived. Then the home team hammered in four runs before two relief pitchers, McNamara and Davies, could stem the tide.

and then stopped. I tried to feel him, but couldn't. New slides kept sifting down. I guess they buried him."

All of the imprisoned men were veteran miners. They were highly regarded among the fraternity of hard rock men of this rugged Mother Lode country. All were unmarried, moving from place to place as their services were required.

The list of dead, in addition to McBride, 26, included: Jock Coyne, 25; F. Erickson, 40, Klamath Falls, Ore.; M. Michaelson, 45, Eugene, Ore.; and William Cope, 50, shift boss.

Recalls Floyd Collins.

The obstacles faced by the rescuers were overcome only after one of the most dramatic struggles of the sort the mining section of northern California has known. Water, oozing down from the roof and sides

of the small bore, made the footing treacherous and slippery. The men stripped to the waist, were covered with the muck and slime that surrounded them.

New cave-ins threatened the lives of the half hundred men who worked in shifts of six. The rude camp at the mouth of the tunnel, accessible from the outside world only by mountain trails which are well high impassable, furnished merely the simplest of comforts after the nerve and body racking work in the shaft.

Probe of Cause

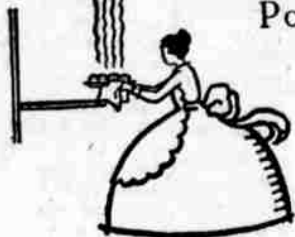

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JURIST ENGLISH BEFORE SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(United News)—For the tenth time in its history, the United States senate has brought an impeachment charge.

In an atmosphere of solemnity, the senate at 2 o'clock received the nine prosecutors of the house and heard the reading of the five impeachment charges against George Washington English, federal district judge for the eastern Illinois district.

Friday the senate will fix the date when Judge English shall be summoned.

There is some controversy as to when the trial is to be held, the senate leaders favoring a delay until November so that there will be no interference with their campaign activities this summer.

Meanwhile Judge English would continue to hold court and draw his salary as a federal judge.

Although there was tense silence in the crowded senate chamber when the sergeant-at-arms called out the "hear ye! hear ye! hear ye!" the proceedings soon became wearisome to some of the senators, who began writing letters, reading books and papers, and conversing in stage whispers.

Reading of the impeachment charges required an hour. It was done by Representative Michener of Michigan, with the other eight members sitting on special chairs which had been placed in a semi-circle in front of the desk.
