

COASTERS OFFER TWO GAME CARD

Standing is Tight With Trailers Close on Leader's Tail

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23.—(United News)—The first week-day double header of the season and a gruelling 14-inning battle between Portland and Mission were the high spots of Friday's Coast League games.

Seattle and Hollywood broke even in their twin bill, the Stars grabbing the first, 8 to 5, and the Indians battling their way to a 7 to 2 win in the second.

Prothero of the Beavers tied the count at four all in the Portland-Mission clash with his circuit drive in the ninth inning. The game went five innings more before Mission put across the deciding tally.

San Francisco's strategy in sending a left-hander against Oakland proved disastrous, Oakland routing Williams and winning, 5 to 2. In the other game Los Angeles shut out Sacramento and stayed in first place by the margin of a full game. The score was 1 to 0, only 11 hits being garnered by both sides.

Only three games now separate the leading Angels and the eighth place Oaks.

Jess McMahon, who makes matches for Tex Rickard, has signed Greb and Flowers for the bout. If the Pittsburgher proves to be in shape he will be a strong favorite to regain his crown.

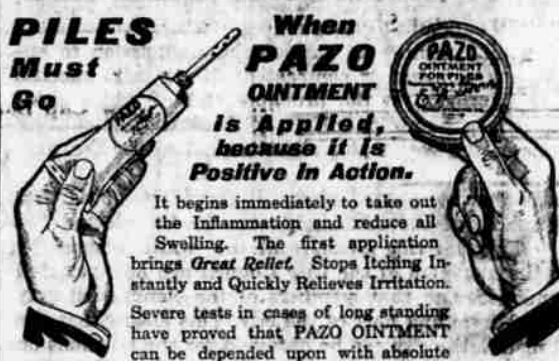
