

Hoff Scores to New Pole Vault Mark

DRAKE STADIUM, Des Moines, Iowa, April 24.—(United Press)—Charlie Hoff, world's champion pole vaulter from Norway, made a new American mark of 13 feet, 9 1/2 inches in the 17th annual Drake relays here today, and three other Drake records were made in field events.

Hoff twice failed to clear the bar at 14 feet 1/2 inch, official measurement, in his efforts to best his own world record of 13 feet 11 1/2 inches. His best mark today exceeded by four inches the American record made by Lee Barnes, University of Southern California, this year.

Roland Locke, speedy sprinter of the University of Nebraska, ran the 100 yard dash in better than world record but his mark will not be allowed because of the strong wind at his back. Locke's time was 9 5/10 seconds.

John Kuck of Kansas Teachers' college, Emporia, smashed both the Drake relay shot put and javelin record. He hurled the shot 48 feet 5 1/2 inches and threw the javelin 237 feet 7 1/2 inches. Previous marks for these events were 47 feet, 9 1/2 inches, made by Schwartz, Wisconsin, 1925, and 203 feet 9 1/2 inches by Angier, Illinois in 1923.

Clarence (Bud) Houser of the University of Southern California, contributed a third new record by hurling the discus 147 feet 7 inches, breaking another Drake record of 146 feet 7 1/2 inches, also held by Schwartz.

HENDERSONVILLE, N. C., April 24.—(United Press)—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, may begin training Monday, he intimated today following a cursory examination of his quarters here. The champion's plans are rather indefinite, he admitted. Whether he will remain in training here until his fight with an opponent to be named by Tex Rickard in September is largely dependent upon the first few weeks' workout, he said.

religious meeting. He was released following the arraignment yesterday morning, on a \$250 bond signed by his father, after a plea of not guilty entered by his attorney, W. P. Meyers. Lang gave himself up to G. D. Cosad of the county sheriff's office.

Elliott Differs

In an informal discussion at the time of the arraignment, District Attorney E. L. Elliott intimated that he would appeal the case upon the ground that the Indians are now United States citizens and hence amenable to state laws. Recent advice from Senator Charles L. McNary indicate that the Indian bureau has long been of the opinion that only the federal government has jurisdiction in cases involving Indians on federal reservations.

Contesting the claims of Lula Lang for the ministry of the Chilquin Shaker church, is Billy Moore of the Mother Anna Lee group. The Lang group is backed by George Hugh Jack, secretary and general organizer of the Indian Shaker church, a Slocum organization.

Editor's Note

The Shakers, or Shaking Quakers, are a religious sect which appeared first in England about 1747. They were originally Quakers, and were called Shakers because they shook their bodies during their religious services. One of their early leaders, Ann Lee, who claimed that she was the reincarnated Christ, settled in America in 1774 with a few converts and set up a church near Watervliet, N. Y. The society is the first communistic organization

known in the United States. Shakers hold many of the views of Quakers and, in addition, practice celibacy, hold their property in common and keep themselves separate from the world. They emphasize work as a help in obtaining a sinless life. A Shaker village usually consists of two or more "families" of thirty or forty. Great emphasis is put upon circumspect conduct. Their religious services are not formal, but include a rhythmic march that is supposed to be a survival of the more violent "shakings" of an earlier day.

probably is true that improvement may be had in methods of farming, however, students of farm problems know the present disturbing problem of the farmer is not production, but rather marketing.

"What the farmer wants to know is how to obtain actual costs of his products. The farmer is not contending for a 5 1/2 per cent guaranteed earning on his investment, but he is entitled to a living wage and a fair return for his efforts. If it is ordered he must continue to pay excessive freight rates on livestock and farm products then it also should be arranged that staple prices of farm products commensurate with such rates be maintained."

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FOUR PER CENT CHURCH MEETING

Portland Pastor Figures On Soir Show by Figures

PORTLAND, April 24.—(United Press)—Four per cent alcohol content may be high for this "non-intoxicating in fact" beer, but the same figure, when representing mid-week prayer meeting attendance is very low, according to officials of the First Presbyterian of Portland.

But while four per cent beer is merely a dream in the minds of the thirsty, four per cent prayer meeting attendance is a fact—and a bothersome one for church leaders.

This poor showing on the part of Protestant church members, as regards those going to prayer meeting, was revealed through a series of letters sent out by Rev. H. L. Bowman to leading churches in the United States.

Replies from 29 churches were received which showed that prayer meeting attendance for the past year hovered between three and four per cent of the membership.
