

WETS WIN, YES THEY DO, MORE DRY BILL TEETH

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(United News)—Drys have shown their power in congress by putting through the house the Green prohibition reorganization bill, which would set up a separate enforcement bureau in the treasury department and pull the enforcement machinery together under one responsible bureau chief.

The measure went through Tuesday without a record vote, 196 to 4, after a day attack from the democratic side on President Coolidge and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon because of alleged laxity of enforcement. Wets did not attempt to force a roll call.

An attempt on behalf of the wets by Laguardia, New York socialist, to amend the bill to permit sale of 2.75 per cent beer, was unceremoniously thrown out on a point of order. His other amendment to require all enforcement officers to give their time exclusively to enforcement of the law was defeated 16 to 64. This was an indirect attempt to rebuke prohibition Administrator Baird of Pittsburgh, who recently admitted he was drawing \$12,000 a year salary as a railroad executive, in addition to his \$8000 government salary.

MARRIAGE HARDER, DIVORCE EASIER, HELD CRIME CURE

BOSTON, April 27.—(United News)—If marriage was made more difficult and divorce easier there would be less crime, declares Mrs. Lillian Saxe Holmes, member of the executive board of the Canadian Prisoners' Welfare association.

A large percentage of crimes and criminal tendencies are born in the unhappy home, she told the New Thought Forum association here. Constant quarreling of parents breeds hate in the child and quite often furnishes the spark that flares into a lawless character, she said.

"For this reason as well as many others," she continued, "I firmly believe that divorce should be made easier. A child could not live and grow up in a worse environment than that provided by vicious parents."

"It is often remarked that marriages are made in heaven, but we all know that 50 per cent of them are made elsewhere. The chief trouble lies in the fact that from the time of Adam and Eve, women have been protected. Under the law, wife deserters are brought back and forced to live with the women they actually hate. Whoever heard of a wife being brought back after she ran away from her husband? A uniform divorce law should be passed, making it easier to secure divorces. In Canada, and most states in your country, divorces are so expensive that the price is prohibitive."

Taking the position that the new fee will be received as a measure similar to prohibition in the United States and thus resented, men of the cloth are joining with bookmakers, charging that an era of "bet-logging" is about to be introduced in England.

The men and women who have deserted their religious works to take up the cudgels against the new tax, and their allies, the bookmakers, are not the only ones leagued against Winston Churchill's race track measure.

No less a personage than Lloyd George, war time premier, has joined the fight.
