

CHURCH BOY ROBS WHEN ROBBED HE SOBS WITH MOBS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 26.—(United News)—Gilbert Paul Woodbridge, his lips quivering and his blue eyes glistening with tears stood in the district courtroom here Monday and listened sadly while his lawyer told the judge what had caused him to take a fling at the hold-up business.

Woodbridge is 21. He belongs to the Methodist church and goes to Sunday school regularly. While his attorney told the judge these things, Woodbridge gnawed his lips nervously.

The case against Woodbridge was simple. Woodbridge stole an automobile Sunday night and drove to a cabaret. Pausing outside long enough to slip a handkerchief over his face he entered with automatic in hand. While robbing the patrons his mask fell down.

He was identified by a scar on his nose.

Twice Robbed

"It was a great shock to all of us," said the lawyer, "for I go to the same church. But the reason for his crime is a curious one. Gilbert was in love with a charming young lady church-goer. A few weeks ago Gilbert saved enough money to marry. Then he was held up and the money taken from him. Now, your honor, the unusual thing about the case is that same thing happened twice, the second time only two weeks ago."

"Yes, your honor, for the second time the money Gilbert had saved to be married with was stolen from him. And that is why he went out to rob. In desperation it was—the desperation of love."

The judge was sorry. He gave Woodbridge the minimum sentence, which was six years in prison. Woodbridge heard this without wincing, but his church friends didn't, they are now working to get him paroled.
