American Lead; Fight Is Close

The neck and neck race between the Cleveland Indians and the New York Yankees for leadership in the American league continued Wednesday. The Giants held their place at the top of the National league, increasing their lead to two games over the Cincinnati Red Sox.

The Indians maintained their tie with the Yankees by a 7 to 3 victory over the St. Louis Browns. Cleveland scored four runs in the eighth and ninth off three St. Louis hurlers.

Bunching their hits in the eighth inning, the Yanks scored three runs off Groves, Athletic hurler, while "Bad Sam" Jones brought further cheer to Miller Huggins' heart by turning in a three-hit performance. "Murderers' row" won't need to function if the other hurlers follow the lead of Shawkey yesterday and Jones today.

The Senators continued winning, cleaning up the series with the Red Sox, the final game score being 5 to 2. Bucky Harris led the Washington attack with a homer and a single.

Chicago kept up its tie for third place with the Senators by beating Detroit, 9 to 5, taking the series, three out of four. Cobb's playing again featured, although Detroit lost. Jack Warner, in his first start for the Giants held the Phillies to five hits, the best pitching performance of the day in the National—while the Giants bunched their singles and won, 5 to 2.

Inability to hit when hits meant runs caused the Reds to fall further below the Giants when they scored only three runs on 12 hits, while the Cardinals scored twice in the ninth and won, 5 to 3.

The Pirates continued climbing also, winning their game, although outlit. Aldridge was in trouble often, but emerged on the long end of a 9 to 4 score.

Brooklyn finally reached the sunny side of 500, through its ninth-inning rally, winning 5 to 4. This is the first time this season that the Robins have more games won than lost.

Shaker Indian Church Strives to Heal Split

SALEM, April 28. — (United News)—Reconciliation of the warring factions on the Klamath Indian reservation is sought by the Indian Shaker church, several officials of which are here Wednesday in conference with state officials. The party includes Sergeant K. Brown, Chiloquin, a leader of the Klamath reservation, Bishop Peter Hack, George Q. Jack, general organizer of the Shaker faith, and Sam Smith, head elder of the church.

Brown passed through Salem several days ago on his way to Oakville, Wash., for a conference with officials of the church there, being accompanied on his return to the Klamath reservation by Bishop Hack, Jack and Smith. Before returning to the Klamath reservation the party will visit the Silver reservation.

Trial Here

The trial of Delford Lang on a charge of disturbing a religious meeting is to be heard before Justice R. A. Emmitt this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The charge is the outcome of an argument at the Chiloquin church between factions of the Shaker faith. Lang's mother being a minister in the Shaker church with her authority based on the church represented by Sergeant K. Brown, who is on his way here with Bishop Peter Hack.

District Attorney Elliott is also planning to make a test case of the matter, it being the first time an Indian has been brought under the state court since the opinion of Judge Leavitt that the state courts have no jurisdiction. Lang is represented by Attorney W. P. Meyers, who says that the case will be appealed; if Lang is not acquitted.

California Runs Out on Oregon Teams

Klamath Falls will participate in an all Southern Oregon baseball league this year. Four California towns took a run out.

Tuesday night four local delegates made the trip to Dunsmuir, where they found the cards stacked against the Oregon teams. The result was Klamath Falls, Medford, and Grants Pass handed in their resignation from the proposed Oregon-California league, and their action will result in a league made up of four Oregon teams, the fourth likely being Ashland. Klamath directors, Austin Hayden, Otto Lorenz, and Lee Crawford, backed up by Dr. G. S. Newsom, who accompanied the directors, accepted the split with California.

The influence of Weed created the rift in the league situation, it was small. One of the Weed directors said Klamath appeared to have too strong a club lined up this year and that idea also appeared to cast a chill over the other small Siskiyou county towns, the result was California refused to play with Klamath Falls.

In the Southern Oregon league directors point out travel expenses will be cut and since the competing towns are all larger than any in Siskiyou county, the class of ball and the support offered the Oregon league should be superior to that in a league which blew up.
