RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

SIXTH STREET, JEFFERSON STREET AND WASHINGTON STREET PAVEMENT

The City Engineer, pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 12th day of April, 1926, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Sixth street from the northern line of High street to the southern line of Lincoln street, Washington street from Sixth street to Seventh street, including intersection at Sixth street, and Jefferson street from Fifth street to Seventh street, including intersection at Sixth street, to be known as Improvement Unit Number 49, and the Council having taken same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory:

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of the said portions of said streets, being the specifications and estimates attached to the plans and estimates filed herein on April 12, 1926, be and the same are hereby approved; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement to consist of paving said portions of said streets with:

(a) Type "C" Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic, 1½" top on 3½" bituminous concrete base or Asphaltic concrete, 1½" top, 1" binder, 3½" asphaltic concrete base; or

(b) Type "A" Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic, 2" top on 4" bituminous concrete base or Asphaltic concrete, 2" top, 1" binder, 4" asphaltic concrete base; or

(c) Warrentite Bitulithic, 2" top on 4" crushed rock base or Asphaltic concrete, 2" top, 1" binder on 4" crushed rock base; at an estimated cost, including cement sidewalks, curbs, gutters and drainage for:

(a) Type "C" Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic, 1½" top on 3½" bituminous concrete base or Asphaltic concrete, 1½" top, 1" binder, 3½" asphaltic concrete base, of \$39,022.10; for (b) Type "A" Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic, 2" top on 4" bituminous concrete base or Asphaltic concrete, 2" top, 1" binder, 4" asphaltic concrete base of \$40,355.30; and for (c) Warrentite Bitulithic, 2" top on 4" crushed rock base or Asphaltic concrete, 2" top, 1" binder on 4" crushed rock base, of \$38,133.30; said estimates to include engineering, supervision, advertising, clerical assistance and unforeseen contingencies; also, said estimates to include the cost of installation of a sanitary sewer system for said district, the main of said sewer to be laid on the lower side of said streets with "Y" branches taken across the streets, so that no pavement will have to be cut in the future; also, allowance for embankment, cement sidewalks on both sides of said streets throughout, retaining walls, header, combination curb and gutters, all as more fully shown in detail on the said plans and specifications, total of \$28,556.50 to be added to each of said estimates; said pavement to be 26 feet wide from High street to Lincoln street on Sixth street; 26 feet wide on Washington street between Sixth and Seventh streets, and 26 feet wide on Jefferson street from Fifth street to Seventh street; with concrete sidewalks five (5) feet wide on both sides thereof throughout the entire length of said improvement, with parking strips leveled and rolled throughout on both sides, except at intersections, where said pavement is to be full width, all in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates filed March 29, 1926, and those attached hereto; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL that the property hereinafter described be and hereby is declared to be benefited, to-wit:

The westerly one-half (½) of Block 41; the Northeast quarter, being the northerly quarter (¼) of Block 41, Nichols Addition to Klamath Falls, Oregon; All of Block 45; Lots 3 to 10, inc., Block 44; Lots 1, 2 and 3, and lots 6 to 10, inc., Block 43; and all of Block 46; all of said lots and blocks being in First Addition to Klamath Falls, Oregon; together with the property lying easterly from the Klamath County High School property, which lies between said High School property and Sixth Street and known as Block 51, First Addition, together with the said High School property, which lies between Block 46 of said First Addition and High Street on the one hand and Fifth and Sixth Streets on the other hand;

Senator Stanfield Renders Great Service To Oregon

In an address, read before the Portland Advertising Club, Wednesday, April 21, 1926, by A. D. Leedy, United States Senator, Robert N. Stanfield said:

"When I entered the U. S. Senate, March 4, 1921, I realized that financial relief must be extended to agriculture through the banks and loan companies that make agricultural loans, to carry them over the period of depression, then prevailing, until the farmers' notes could be reduced or paid.

"Helps Promote \$50,000,000 Bank Pool

"Early in 1921, I introduced a bill to amend the War Finance Corporation Act, to permit this wartime institution to extend relief to these agricultural banks and loan companies.

"Large banking interests of the East protested against this amendment because they did not want the Government to enter the banking business.

"They proposed a \$50,000,000 pool instead, and I spent much time helping to form this pool, but, while helpful, it proved inadequate and only afforded slight relief.

"Stanfield Comes to Rescue With Amendment

"After the partial failure of the pool, I insisted upon and secured passage of my amendment to the War Finance Corporation Act and under this authorization the War Finance Corporation made advances for agricultural relief amounting to \$298,000,000, of which the banks trust and loan companies of Oregon that serve agriculture received \$6,696,000, nearly all of which has been repaid. I am proud to state.

"Drafted Into Relief Service By Treasury Dep't

"As soon as the War Finance Corporation was prepared to function under this law, and at the request of the Treasury Department, I went West, where I spent months assisting and advising with the bankers, thereby enabling them to procure the needed help quickly and before it was too late to save them. Fortunately, very few failed in Oregon in comparison to other states.

"Forced to Keep Silent to Protect the Banks

"Much was said about my absence from the Senate during this time, but I was forced to keep silent and go about my work without referring to my absence or mission, because if the people had known why I was in the West and what I was doing, suspicion would have been directed to every bank I entered, and to every banker with whom I talked. Until the banks could turn their frozen paper into liquid assets, my silence was imperative to avoid embarrassment to them and the defeat of the relief needed and sought.

"Attendance Record Since Crisis Uninterrupted

"The storm has now passed. All of our banks are in a sound condition, and I am at liberty to tell why I was away from my seat in the Senate during this time. Since this period, however, my attendance in the Senate compares very favorably with that of any other senator, and, during the last Congress was very near the highest mark. Answering the roll call is, however, in itself no proof of real service."
