

DEMPSEY FACES FINANCIAL ROWS FOR HEAVY CROWN

Meeting to Determine Who is Who in Bank Fight Circles

NEW YORK, April 29.—(United News)—Within 24 hours more is likely to be accomplished towards a fight for the heavyweight championship of the world than has been possible in three years.

Tex Rickard will be there with a number of things on his chest. The promoter confirmed the United News story of April 21 to the effect that he will not tell the commission what opponent he has in mind for Dempsey. Instead he will listen to any suggestions.

Tunney Hopes

Billy Gibson, manager of Gene Tunney, who has just breezed in to make a determined fight to side-track Harry Wills in case the larger and more logical challenger is considered, will have several ears full of suggestions to offer. Paddy Mullins, with Harry Wills in tow, may be the same sorrowfully silent Celt to all outward appearances, but he and his negro meal ticket have whispered to Rickard that they are ready to go under the Texan's banner any time now.

William Muldoon, dean of the commission, will be on hand to declare himself against Wills. It is understood that this announcement bears the stamp of approval with an Albany date.

Chairman James A. Farley of the commission will offer flat opposition to Muldoon on behalf of Wills. Or at least he has promised to unless that wind from Albany blows too strongly. There might, in fact, be more war in the commission's own meeting than in the ring, no matter who meets.

The matter seems exceedingly safe. Jack Dempsey has sent a telegram to Tex Rickard, reading: "Get me Wills."

Tex has Dempsey signed up and Wills and Mullins are willing.

All the boxing commission has to do is to make up its own mind about the advisability of a mixed bout so shortly before the next democratic convention, and leave it to Rickard to do the rest.

Billy Gibson will have an ear to the keyhole, and if Wills is not approved he can be expected to fall into the room in his eagerness to speak his piece for Tunney.

All in all this looks like the making of some real business.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—(United News)—So close is the Pacific Coast league race that Thursday's games caused a change of position for every club in the circuit.

Los Angeles, instead of leading the pack, is now tied for first place with Oakland. The Angels lost to Seattle, 6 to 1. Oakland shut out Mission, 8 to 0.

Seattle went from fourth place to third, passing Sacramento, which was defeated by Hollywood, 5 to 3. The Stars advanced to the top of the second division, from sixth place. Mission took the vacated berth.

San Francisco eased itself out of the cellar by a victory over Portland, 10 to 3. The win was the first Dicky Kerr, former White Sox twirler, has turned in this season.

There were three home runs. Rohwer of Portland made a four-ply swat in the second inning; Shinn of Oakland turned in a circuit clout in the sixth and Hoffman of Sacramento homed in the fifth.

Yanks Win Six and Take Lead

"Murderers' row" cut loose in two big innings at Washington Thursday afternoon and the Yankees broke the tie for first place in the American league and went out alone in front by virtue of an 8 to 5 victory. It was six straight for the Huguenots. Jess Petty, phenomenal Brooklyn southpaw, won his fourth straight game, beating the Phillies, 3 to 1, and pitching the Rollins to within one game of the Giants, who still lead the National league race, although they lost to the Boston Braves by a 4 to 2 score.

Cincinnati drove three Pittsburgh pitchers from the mound in the fifth inning, in which the Reds scored 10 runs, the final result being 16 to 9. Bill McKechnie used six pitchers altogether trying to stop the Reds, who now are tied with Brooklyn for second place.

Joe McCarthy's ambitious Cubs reached the top of the second division by mauling the Cardinals 6 to 5, in a free hitting contest at Chicago.

Cleveland dropped from a time from first place in the American league, when the White Sox defeated Speaker's tribe 7 to 3, and the Athletics pulled up a notch when old Jack Quinn shut out the Red Sox, 4 to 0.

The St. Louis Browns, cellar occupants in the younger circuit, won their fifth game of the season, beating Detroit 3 to 2.

Jacques Fourrier went into the lead among National league home run hitters by driving out his fourth of the year, off Knight of the Phillies. Three home runs featured the Cubs' win over the Cards, Munson, Bottomley and Wilson contributing four-ply blows.

"Goose" Goslin of the Senators, who is leading the American league in batting, hit a homer off Herb Pennock at New York, and Tony Lazzeri, the former Pacific coast star, rapped one of Jo Bush's offerings into the bleachers in the same game.

Ty Cobb contributed the remaining home run of a heavy hitting day.

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Colorado Dam at Boulder to Surpass Canal

LAS VEGAS, Nev., April 29.—(United News)—Secretary of the Interior, Dr. Hubert Work committed the department of a policy of immediate construction of the Boulder dam by the federal government in an address here Thursday.

"This year my department is asking for an appropriation of \$129,000,000 less than in the first year of my administration," Work said. "I feel that I have saved that money and I want \$125,000,000 of it to spend on the Boulder dam project."

The 600 foot high Boulder Dam to be built 31 miles from Las Vegas under the Swing-Johnson bill now pending passage in congress will create the largest reservoir in the world, 120 miles long and storing more than 18 months' flow of the Colorado river.

AUSTRALIA PUTS ON HUGE STORAGE DAMS

VICTORIA, B. C., April 29.—(United News)—Speaking enthusiastically about irrigation and reclamation work in Australia, the Earl of Stradbroke was here Thursday evening en route to Washington, D. C.

"The Hume reservoir will lock up the Murray river, which is 120 miles long, and will store up a body of water greater than the Sidney harbor," he said.
