Army Is Friend to Sickly Girl

"Pardon me, Miss, can I be of any assistance to you?" was the question of a sympathetic citizen of Klamath Falls to a young woman, evidently in distress, and standing wearily and uncertainly near the railroad station. Noticing her evident want of aid, and after hesitating due to the usual suspicion with which such offers are regarded, this citizen was at length convinced that the urgency of the stranger's need was greater than the barrier of convention.

The eldest of nine children, disabled from active work on account of an attack of influenza three years ago, and finally driven from her home at Anderson, California, by a selfish father, who hated her for her inability to work, the girl had been given just enough money to come to Klamath Falls, with but 50 cents left over. Her first response to the question of the local citizen was to ask where she could obtain a room for 50 cents. Noticing a woman in the garb of a Salvation Army worker approaching, the kindly disposed citizen replied that he knew of no rooms for 50 cents, but that she would doubtless receive help at the Salvation Army. The Army worker proved to be Mrs. W. E. Hopper, wife of Captain Hopper of the local unit, who took the girl in hand, provided her with food and shelter, and later with employment. The employment first found proved too heavy for the strength of the girl, who has since been given work of an easier nature.

Such cases are constantly arising in connection with the relief work of the local unit of the Salvation Army, according to Captain Hopper.

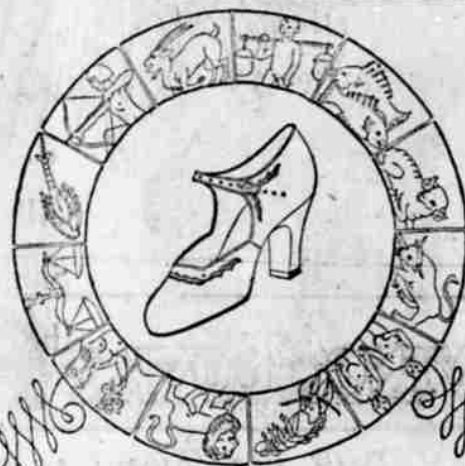

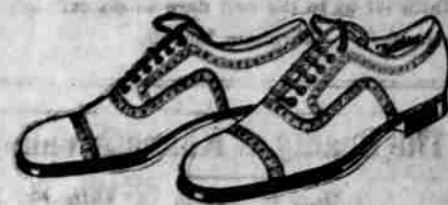
