

Starkey and Lewis Fight Lively Draw

Klamath fight fans saw one of the sweetest slugging matches staged here in many a moon last night at the Scandia hall when Kid Starkey mauled his way to a draw with Frankie Lewis, Klamath Indian from Bend. The bout went the full ten rounds and the fans sat up and howled. Kid Starkey is entitled to the lion's share of credit for his heady comeback in the final stages of the quarrel, when Lewis, who is one of the most willing sluggers who ever stepped in a Klamath ring, appeared to have a slight edge in the first five rounds.

The weight for Starkey and Lewis was announced as 140 pounds each, but the ring side fans were practically unanimous in figuring Lewis from five to ten pounds the heavier man.

In the six round semi-final Eddie Greenlee of Bend, who carries a real punch and a fighting heart, tipped Billy Huff of Chiloquin, over in the fifth round and Huff remained groggy in his corner for 10 minutes after the whirlwind battle. Huff was knocked down twice in the fourth round but managed to weather the storm though out on his feet. This was a first class event and got over big.

In the Harms-Woods fight of four rounds, Woods earned the referee's decision for putting up the best quarrel although Harms was the favorite of the crowd. When Tom Watters, referee, raised Woods hand the crowd roared a protest. Woods had six pounds the advantage in weight. Both boys missed enough wild swings to win the championship of South America.

Beryl Robertson and Tiny Blehn put up a swell little curtain raiser. These little fellows gave all they had and were given a big hand when Watters called their bout a draw at the close.

cense cedar, for which the purchasers bid \$2.26 per thousand, and other species of timber for which they bid \$1.91.

An interesting note in connection with the bidding yesterday was the fact that the Ewanna Box company which bid only 17 cents under the Chiloquin Lumber company for the pine, overbid the winning bidders \$1.74 for the fir and cedar on the tract, so in reality the bids were somewhat closer together than would appear at the first glance. The Chiloquin Lumber company gets the fir and cedar for \$2.26, while the Ewanna bid \$4 per thousand for these scattering classes of timber.

New Mill

The Chiloquin Lumber company, the new owners of the Weeks timber, are at the present time preparing to build a new sawmill on the site of their plant which was burned about two months ago, in the outskirts of Chiloquin. The work on the new mill will probably be rushed from now on to permit the company to start cutting their new timber holdings by early next season. A logging road will probably be constructed from the Bray mill line into the Weeks tract which is said to be an exceptionally favorable logging prospect for the Chiloquin Lumber company.

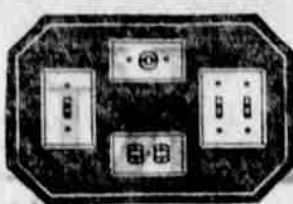

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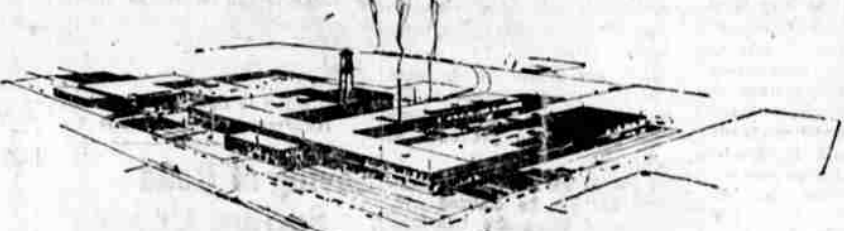
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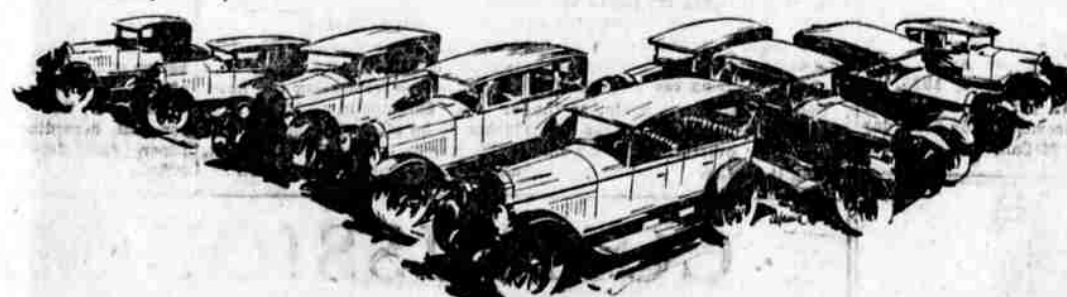
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
